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






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founder's letter





Repeat after me:

Life doesn't wait for anyone. The only constant is change. It is ok to cut up your photos.

Every photograph we take does not have to look professional.

Using multiple photos on a scrapbook page is very effective at communicating a sense of progression from one to the next and, thus, creating movement. With more than one photo to tell your particular story, the multi-photo layout illustrates a "slice of life" in a more dynamic way.

Why use more than one photo? For starters, the novice scrap-booker may get overwhelmed at the sheer number of photos that "need" to be scrapbooked. Therefore, the concept of one-photo-per-layout can seem like an insurmountable, life-long task! Although there is a time and a place for single-photo layouts in scrapbooking, there must be a specific story to be told by that one extraordinary picture. Not all of us have access to extraordinary photos, especially if some of our photos are from the pre-digital era. Perhaps there are an abundance of photos from the same event, or from the same type of event, which have accumulated over time. Multi-photo layouts are perfect for displaying a passage of time or a period of growth.

Maybe you have pictures that individually are not outstanding or that don't paint the entire picture but, when grouped together, effectively tell the story. These types of pictures include family-posed shots or an out-of-focus portrait shot. For example, the layout entitled, "three little birds," contains not-so-spectacular photos of my daughters that, on their own, told little of the story I wanted to tell. But, merely by showcasing their faces (as well as one candid photo of the three of them), I had my story. I wasn't remembering a specific event: I was documenting how waking up to their very existence can make everything - even the worst of times - ok. The title "three little birds" thus refers to not only my three daughters, but to the title and theme of the old Bob Marley song.

Sometimes the same event can be seen from many different perspectives. The soccer game (my middle child's first experience with organized sports) is, by its nature, full of movement. So, the "stop/go" layout follows this experience. It was important for me to include lots of action shots to adequately tell the story.

Multi-photo layouts can also be an effective time and space saver. For example, if you have a million birthday party or holiday photos that span a few years, why not group them all together on a double-page spread? Representing one theme with photos from different periods in your life demonstrates both growth and continuity, all at the same time.

Rozanne's tips for using multiple-photos effectively:

- Use a square punch it easily creates a "grid" feel on your layout. Use the window in the punch as a guide for deciding what part of the photo contributes the most to your story
- Try a photo collage this works well when you have many photos that cannot all be cropped to a uniform size or shape.
 A collage creates a focal point – think of it as one large photo (see the "stop/go" layout)
- Remember that the repetition of size and shape connects the story and demonstrates continuity
- Try not to showcase multiple photos of different sizes by matting each one separately on a double-page spread. You will lose any type of connectedness and each photo will look like an "island" that is floating all by itself

If you find yourself intimidated by layouts that contain what looks like "that perfect, professionally-captured portrait," remind yourself that life is not as organized, intentional, or as perfect as those shots would make you believe. You may come across the odd shot like that, but generally, our lives are composed of a series of not-so-perfect images, moments, and experiences. These images tell our stories, and that is the beauty and the essence of scrapbooking: It changes the way we celebrate and it changes what we choose to remember.


Felt by Beth Sears



One of the many appealing things about the resurgence of felt is that it is so easy to find. A trip to your local scrapbooking or on-line store will reveal that felt is being produced in dozens of colours by many manufacturers. Now readily available are die-cut shapes, letters, ribbon and embellishments – all in patterns and colours that coordinate with entire product lines.

Digital scrappers will be happy to know that there are also digital versions of felt embellishments available for purchase. Similarly, sheets of felt can be found at a variety of craft stores, fabric stores and even dollar stores. These sheets come in several sizes, colours, and types (soft – for general crafting and sewing; stiffened – for die-cutting; and adhesive backed – great for use with punches).

Do you know what all of this great product has translated into for me? Shopping! I have had so much fun purchasing and subsequently creating with felt. You can see how designer Virginia Nebel and I have used felt to add immediate interest, dimension, and a "homespun" charm to all of these projects.

Reasons for using felt on your pages and projects

- Felt cuts easily and doesn't fray
- It adds great dimension and texture without any extra weight
- Felt can be adhered with a glue stick, glue dots, or any type of liquid glue
- It is extremely versatile it can be stamped, die-cut, or sewn
- Felt adds a sense of "warmth" to pages and projects

So, if you are new to the world of felt, or if you haven't seen it since the 70's, here are some tips and tricks to help get you started:

Tips and Tricks

- When stamping on felt, use dark coloured pigment ink for the best effect
- If you are not confident in your sewing abilities, try sewing on the felt and then gluing the item down, no one will ever know that you didn't sew it directly onto the page
- Break out the die-cut machine or stencils. Felt looks great cut into shapes such as: flowers, arrows, punctuation, photo corners and frames, labels and tabs
- Dust off the deco scissors and use them on stiffened felt to make some inexpensive ric-rac
- Soft felt will cut easily in a good rotary trimmer
- Adhesive backed felt works well with large punches

The cooler fall temperatures are dictating that there is no time like the present to begin creating with felt!

Whether you end up using it on nearly every project (like I do) or merely use it as an occasional accent, I am sure you will appreciate felt's versatility and practicality. I think you will also agree that all good things deserve a second day in the sun!

"we need a background check..."

I like the look of background stamps, but I am not sure how to use them. Can you please explain what different types of background stamps there are and give me some tips on using them?

Christine's stamping tip: Think outside of the box (or paper as the case may be). Background images can be used to add interest to candles, tins, glass, etc. Just remember that when you are stamping on a non-porous surface you need to use a permanent ink.



Use a small background stamp and versamark ink to create this great watermarked look.

- There are many different types of background stamps and they can be used in a variety of ways:
 - •large stamps (approximately 4x6) usually contain a repetitive patterned image such as a script, harlequin or other geometric pattern. These stamps cover a card face with a single stamping.
 - •stamp rollers can be used to create a border on a small piece of cardstock, or they can be used to quickly cover an entire 12 x 12 sheet.
 •small stamps have images that can be repetitively stamped to create a background. Any small image can work as a "background" stamp.

Try any of the following techniques and create gorgeous backgrounds in an instant!

Small background stamps can be used to create an entirely new image. Try using a variety of images and ink colours to create depth and visual interest.







Tired of journaling always being an afterthought when it comes to designing scrapbook pages? We've got tips and tricks that will help you gather your thoughts and get your story told.

part three

We recently downsized from a large 4-bedroom, 2-story house in a small town, to a small 2-bedroom townhouse in a much larger town. The move was everything you'd expect, with just a few bumps along the way. The biggest obstacle to overcome? Figuring out how to fit our jam-packed big house into our smaller apartment. Obviously, we had to get rid of some stuff. A lot of stuff.

As I was going through our closet during the packing process, I came across an entire shoebox crammed with notes I'd saved from high school, as well as a couple of my old diaries. I couldn't help laughing – and even cringing – at my (younger) self as I read through them. When I was finished, I added the shoebox to the "keep" pile. The rest of the afternoon passed in a blur of packing tape and boxes, but my mind strayed often to that box. I remembered how painstakingly we'd fold our notes, as well as the lengths to which we'd go just to keep them out of the wrong hands. I remembered the hiding places I devised for my diary, all to keep my sister from snooping. I remembered how much time I spent, either writing in my diary or penning notes to my best friends. Apparently, I had a lot to say.

I still do, but now I just do it on my scrapbook pages. And even today, there are items on my scrapbook pages that I don't want just anyone to read. Sometimes the journaling is just too raw or painful; sometimes what I write is intended for only one person; and sometimes, I just run out of room for all the things I want to say. If you've ever been faced with the same dilemma, then read on to see how you can include lengthy or private journaling on your pages with ease.

Got a lot to say?

Just because you're limited to a 12x12 or 8.5x11 scrapbook page doesn't mean you have to limit what you want to say on your pages. There are lots of options for when you've got a big story to tell:

- Take it easy on the photos. If the story's what's really important, then limit your photos to a couple of small ones – or no photos at all. There's no rule that says you have to have a picture to go with every story
- Change your type. Using your computer for lengthy journaling
 is helpful it's easier to fit more words on the page, and
 you're less likely to run out of room. With a number of
 formatting options available, you can make sure you've got
 everything where you want it
- Go batty! Using dingbats or other symbols in place of key words is a great way to add visual interest and to shorten your story just a bit. Search the internet for free dingbats or doodle your own if you're feeling artistic

No room? No problem!

Of course, there are times when you've got a lot to say – and a lot of pictures on your page. What do you do without sacrificing page elements? Get creative! Maximizing all the space on your layout not only gives you more room to say what you need to say, but it also adds an element of surprise to your design.

Ready to give it a shot yourself? Here are some great ways to include journaling on an already full page:

- Take it out back. The easiest way to add journaling to an already full page? Write it on the back. Just flip your layout over and journal on the backside. Then, when you've tucked your layout into the page protectors of your album, it's hidden from view but still easily readable
- Add a few layers. Use a word processing program and printer
 to add computer journaling to a transparency; then layer that
 over other elements on your page. Or go low-tech and use a
 pen designed for slick surfaces (American Crafts makes a
 great one) to do the same with handwritten journaling
- Journal on your photo. This works especially well with photos
 that have lots of "dead" space large areas of background,
 such as grass, sky, or other surfaces. Journaling on your
 photo adds a really modern, funky feel to your layout

You

don't have to create special pockets for journaling tags – just about any area of your layout will work. Audrey tucked her journaling tag behind a large piece of patterned paper on her layout and added a few extra tag shapes for balance at the bottom.


For your eyes only

Sometimes the memories we want to preserve on our scrapbook pages aren't the memories we want everyone to know about. Sometimes our lives have rough patches, and telling those stories is another way to make it through them. What do you do to keep these private thoughts well hidden? Take advantage of a number of products and techniques that can keep your journaling safely tucked out of sight and make sure that your journaling element blends well with your design – this will ensure that the only people who know it's there are the ones who know where to look.

 Flip it over. Put the space behind your photos to good use by adding hinges (use store-bought metal hinges attached with




eyelets or brads, or make your own from paper, fabric, or ribbon) to the photo and journal underneath it. Other page elements can also be used as flaps – try hiding your journaling behind the title block or underneath some cool page embellishments, such as flowers

• Tuck it in. Add your journaling to strips of paper or fun little tags; then tuck it behind a photo or a piece of patterned paper. You can use little pockets and envelopes in the same manner. If you're worried about your page protector getting in the way, use a craft knife to cut a small slit along the opening – then you can just pull the journaling out without removing the entire page

• Get interactive! There are numerous patterns available in technique books and on the Internet that will teach you a number of interactive methods for hiding your journaling, including fold-out books, sliding tabs, and more. While these methods work well, they probably aren't the best choice for sensitive words, since their fun nature invites viewers to pull, push, or slide them along. But if you want a fun way to share information, this is the way to go!

Don't let worry keep you from putting your thoughts – positive AND negative – down on your layouts. Your scrapbook pages provide a real glimpse into your daily life; don't censor yourself just because you're afraid someone might read what you've written. Instead, take one of these techniques and incorporate it into the next project you create. After all, scrapbooking is about telling the stories you want to tell – **in your words, your way.**





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

Much like circus animals on a teetering scale, the elements on our scrapbook pages need to be balanced. Balance refers to the even weight distribution of the elements on our layouts and is essential to good design. Each of these individual elements – things like colour, size, texture, shape, etc., have a perceived visual

weight; how well each individual element attracts, and then holds, the viewer's attention determines this weight. Thus, to achieve balance, we must first consider the visual weight of these elements, and then arrange them to balance on our layout – just like they would on an imaginary scale.



Note how the gold photo matte and the journaling block balance one another symmetrically. While each element is of a different size and colour, the journaling creates an intricacy that equals the weight of the rich gold colour of the matte; thus creating balance.

How weight is determined:

Colour: Vibrant colours attract your eye, and therefore weigh more than neutral, muted colours. For example, a small square of red would need a larger block of a light or neutral colour to balance it out.

Value: The darker an element, or the more contrast it holds to the rest of the layout, the more weight it carries. Close up photos also carry more weight.

Shape: Intricately detailed areas, such as areas covered with patterned paper, weigh more than flat, simple, or plain areas.

Position: An element set off to one side of the page will carry more weight by being isolated. As well, the closer an element is to the center of the layout, the more weight it commands.

Texture: Textured elements such as fabric, cardboard, and textured cardstock command your attention more so than non-textured elements.

Size: Fairly obvious, but the larger the element, the more weight it carries.

Following our discussion of weight comes the discussion of another important factor – symmetry. Balance can be created through the use of either symmetrical or asymmetrical design:

A symmetrical design is one with an imaginary line that creates two similar halves. A good example of naturally-occurring symmetry is a butterfly with two identical sides. Balance is almost always a guarantee when the

two halves of a layout (vertical or horizontal) correspond to one another.

Asymmetrical balance then, is design without a line of The goal is symmetry. ultimately to arrange the elements so that they appear random, yet connected, all at the same time. Albeit a little more difficult to create, asymmetrical design is extremely versatile and informal.

Here, the weight and texture of the title balances the photo and the gorgeous hand-stitched design element balances the vertical strip of patterned paper.

Here are some suggestions for creating balance in an asymmetrical design:

- Use your intuitive sense of balance to arrange your elements - go with what feels right
- Starting with your background paper, begin layering with your largest elements first and build upon the layers with smaller and smaller elements
- Working in three's, arrange the elements in triangles. As you add more elements, create layers of imaginary triangles in varying shapes and sizes
- If you have an element that is creating imbalance, anchor it with an element of equal weight but of a different shape, size, texture, etc. on the opposite side of the page
- Instead of looking at each element individually and determining how it is being balanced, look at the layout as a whole. A balanced layout will lead your eye around seamlessly
- Test the balance of your layout by rotating it around and viewing it from all angles - the layout should appear balanced from all angles, yet will more than likely have only one definite orientation of top and bottom (a wellbalanced layout will have slightly more weight at its bottom)

This layout is perfect for showcasing how both position and colour affect balance. The black elements on the page add appropriate weight – the letters by balancing the photo, and the journaling tag by drawing the eye down. No matter which direction you turn this layout, it remains completely balanced.

Of all of the tips and tricks we have discussed, I feel that the most important is intuition. It takes some practice, as well as the application of some of the above, but I firmly believe that our most valuable resource is our own personal sense of intuition. Trust me, scrapbookers have a sixth

sense – and this is it! This sixth sense, paired with our new-found knowledge of these design principles, will ensure that our pages will be well-executed, visually appealing, and, above all, BALANCED.


medium for using up scrap pieces of paper, ribbon, and other embellishments. Wow, that is a lot of reasons!

Bilingual Scrapbooking THE HARMONIZATION OF TWO Beautiful LANGUAGES by Melanie Blackburn

I am Francophone, but learned English very early in my life.

On the one hand, the majority of scrapbooking products are in English, but on the other hand, I wanted my daughter to have albums made in her mother tongue. I struggled with this for quite awhile, and for the longest time, I scrapbooked in English only. However, as I gained more experience and found my own unique style, I realized that it was ok to mix both languages on one layout. In fact, I realized that it was more than ok – it adds a unique depth to my pages that wasn't there before – and, it represents ME and the successful integration of both languages that makes up my day to day life.

There is no doubt about it - the scrapbooking industry has many remarkable scrapbooking companies who continually strive to come out with the latest and greatest products. When I started scrapbooking, however, the number of companies who manufactured French products was few and far between. I am very happy to say that all that is quickly changing and there are more and more French companies appearing all the time. I have chosen to feature a few of my favourite manufacturers on the projects that are featured here.

Melanie's Favourite French Scrapbooking Products

Rouge de Garance: Great rub-ons; they have funky patterns, fun quotes, and they apply very well

Bobardo: The velvet stickers are addictive! They come in fun swirls, florals, arrows, and stars and they add great dimension to a layout

Scrapmode: The chipboard words are beautiful; they come in fun fonts, are available in eight different themes and are easy to alter

DDDesigns7: They offer lots of theme-oriented stickers in a variety of shapes and colours

Melanie's advice on how to integrate both languages on your artwork:

When shopping, look for words that have the same spelling in both French and English (ex. "adore," "unique," "explore," "nature," "courage"); this makes your "stash" of product more versatile.

To unify a layout, complete both the title and the journaling in one language, but mix-up both for any additional embellishments (see the "Plaisirs d'automne" layout).

Use the same word in both languages on your project – for example, use both the word "thank you," as well

as the word "merci" for both interest and a bit of word play (see the "merci" card).

Integrate both languages right into your journaling by choosing to highlight key words in one language and the rest of the text in another – this adds both character and personality to your page (see both the "Bonne Fete" and the "Love this Face" layouts).

I have found that my bilingual pages possess a certain element of interest and personality that they just didn't have before. Using both English and French in my scrapbooking has added a level of insight into the person I am and the memories I cherish. I have explored the harmony that comes when two languages co-exist on one page; and I encourage you to try it too. Happy scrapping!

- 5) Die-cut the word "hi" and adhere to the bottom right corner.

instructions:

- 1) Cut a 5.5x3.5 scalloped card base from cardstock.
- 2) Cut the patterned paper to 5.25x3.25 and round all four
- 3) Die-cut a 2.5 inch scalloped square from patterned paper and emboss; sand edges and adhere; outline with a black
- 4) Die-cut a 2 inch scalloped circle from cardstock; adhere the "enjoy" sticker on top; outline the sticker with a black pen.
- 5) Weave the ribbon onto the ribbon slides; attach ribbon approx. 1 inch from the top of the patterned paper and secure; attach the pearl brad in the centre.
- 6) Adhere chipboard letters.





- 4) Stamp sentiment on cardstock and punch out using a small oval punch.
- 5) Using a paper piercer, pierce a "stitched" edge along the outside of the green patterned paper and down the middle of the strap; complete the look of faux stitching using a brown pen to mimic thread.
- 6) Sponge all edges with ink.
- 7) Adhere all pieces to card base.
- 8) Add 3 brads spaced evenly along strap.



- 4) Adhere both pieces to card base.
- 5) Stamp filigree circles as shown and embellish as desired.
- 6) Apply "bloom" sentiment to white cardstock; ink edges and adhere to piece of olive cardstock; ink edges again and adhere to card with dimensional adhesive.
- Add small shovel (tied with ribbon) to card using several strong glue-dots.



Happy Halloween, by Kathleen Taylor, Kearneysville, WV

supplies: cardstock, Bazzill • patterned paper, Junkitz • ink, Clearsnap • embellishments, Junkitz, Heidi Swapp, Making Memories, Westrim, ProvoCraft • adhesive, Beacon

instructions:

- 1) Cut a 6x5 card base from cardstock; ink edges.
- 2) Cut a 6x4.5 piece of patterned paper; ink edges and adhere to the front of the card.
- 3) Cut a circle from cardstock; add a strip of patterned paper to the middle; ink edges and adhere to the front of the card.
- 4) Embellish as desired.

Thankful (see page 52) instructions:

- 1) Cut a 5.5x5.5 card base from cardstock.
- Cut a 5.25x5.25 piece of patterned paper; ink the edges and adhere to the front of the card.
- 3) Cut a circle from cardstock and trim to a partial circle as shown.
- 4) Cut out a shape from a printed transparency; adhere by stitching around perimeter of circle.
- 5) Embellish front of card with layered flower and rhinestones.

Overlays and transparencies are "all the rave" right now, and they add instant pizzazz to your layouts and projects. However, trying to incorporate a transparency into your project can sometimes be challenging. Where do you place the transparency design in relation to your pictures? How do you make the transparency design a complimentary part of your layout and not the focal point? We asked design team member Holly Pittroff to show us just how easy and versatile working with transparencies can be.

Holly's tips and tricks:

- Transparencies are available in a multitude of colours, themes and patterns choose one that appeals to you
- Lay your transparency over various patterned papers until you find a look that you like. From this point, decide what project you will make (ex. card, frame, layout)
- For more intricate projects (ex. the Remember frame), use a craft knife to cut out the section of the transparency that you wish to use
- Use any kind of clear drying adhesive to adhere the transparency to the project and apply the adhesive in obscure areas where it will not be noticed (or use brads, eyelets, sewing or staples as an alternative to adhesive)





Sketches have long been known for their versatility and time-saving abilities. By providing quick and accessible "hits of inspiration," a sketch can eliminate our design headaches and allow us time to just enjoy working with our photos. But, let's not limit ourselves to what we think a sketch can do! Cindy shows us how we can get lots of different ideas from just one sketch.

Other ways to alter or "stretch" sketches

- Change the size take a 12x12 sketch and make it into an 8x8
- Change the orientation slide, flip, or turn the sketch
- Feel free to exchange a photo for a journaling block or vice versa
- Improvise with shape replace circles with squares, stars, or even flowers

Other projects that you could make using this great sketch:

- A picture frame
- A gift tag
- An altered album cover
- A calendar or sequence of special events
- An accordion style mini book

A sketch by no means has to be an exact copy. Turn it, flip it, stretch it across two pages, or reassemble the design elements to suit your theme. Make it your own or leave it alone; it's entirely up to you!

Here, Cindy effectively turned a single-page layout into a well-balanced double, replaced the circle elements with stars to keep things interesting, and chose not to highlight any one particular photo.

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
easy, Getailed EXPERT

I took these beautiful photos on a cool, foggy autumn day last November. It had rained earlier in the day and the precipitation had left some of the most perfectly formed raindrops that I had ever seen.

I must have walked past these plants at least five times throughout the course of the afternoon. Finally, I decided to run inside, grab my camera and photograph this remarkable foliage. I'm so happy that I did!



For the easy layout, I wanted to make sure that the emphasis was on the photos. I did this by enlarging the main photo, by matting all of them with coordinating solid cardstock, and by placing them in the upper third of the layout. I used clear acetate letters to reinforce the drops of rain on the leaves and to add to the "natural" feel of the layout.






detailed

I wanted to draw more attention to the title for my detailed layout. To do this, I added a circle cut from a contrasting piece of patterned paper. I liked how the weathered paint paper added to the overall feel of the layout. To create the cool "wet" look on the acetate letters, I used alcohol inks on a piece of white felt and then dabbed it onto the back of my clear letters. I also added clear gems. By changing the placement of the photos, I drew more attention to the title, while still allowing the photos to shine. Finally, I added hand journaling on a tag to make the layout more personal and to tell the story behind the photos.

expert

I love adding "eye candy" to my pages. For the expert layout, I used a clear glaze to add rain dots right on top of the pictures and to create an "epoxy-like" look for the metal tag. By resizing a couple of pictures, I allowed more room for some great embellishments. As well, a leaf element (cut from another piece of patterned paper) created a sense of movement on the page. Finally, I shifted the large rectangle of patterned paper to the bottom of the layout to provide some grounding for my feature photo and the journaling tag. The result is a page that has lots of texture, visual interest and accents that play on the theme of the layout.


