

step up your snapshots

Know your lighting basics. BY ELISHA SNOW

Understanding the different types of lighting and how to use them can make all the difference in a picture you like vs. a picture you love. Let's shine a light on this fundamental of photography.




Front Light

CAMERA SETTING:

ISO 100; f/2.8; 1/125 sec

WHAT: Light shining directly on the subject. WHY: Good for glamour shots, photos of children, and other situations where you want to provide flat, non-dimensional lighting, and eliminate as many shadows as possible. This light is also best for getting both your subject and the background properly exposed.

WHEN/HOW: Best used when the front light isn't too bright (to avoid squinting eyes). If you're outdoors, use the sun just after it rises, or just before it sets (any other time of day it would be considered "overhead light"). If you're indoors, turn your subject directly facing a window.



Side Light

CAMERA SETTING:

ISO 400; f/1.8; 1/250 sec

WHAT: Directional light coming in from the side, where one side of the subject is bright, and the other side is slightly shaded.

WHY: Used to create shadows and show depth and dimension, this lighting is commonly used in studio-style portraits, as well as classic art portraits.

WHEN/HOW: If you're outdoors, position your subject so the sun is shining on one side of the face, creating soft shadows on the other. Sunrise and sunset lighting is best. If indoors, position your subject so they're turned slightly away from the window/light source (about 45 degrees).

Back Light

CAMERA SETTING:

ISO 400; f/14; 1/160 sec

WHAT: Directional light, where the light source is directly behind your subject.

WHY: Used to create silhouetted photos.

WHEN/HOW: If you are familiar with manual mode on your camera you can manipulate settings (ISO, shutter speed, and aperture) in order to get your camera to "see" the subject rather than the background light. The result: a properly exposed subject and a blown out background.



design from Greta goes to show that patterned paper can be a beautiful alternative to the solid structure of cardstock you may be used to. Don't be afraid to mix things up once in a while and put your solids in the foreground. It will allow your photos to shine and have you seeing your cardstock/patterned paper relationship in a new way. SCT



Accent clusters, or small groupings of embellishments, make the solid foreground of Greta's design pop. By placing those clusters around her otos, the focus remains on the heart of her design as the eye is naturally guided from one striking image to the next

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project: trend

A report on the latest trend-setting products hitting the scrapbook runway (and scrapbook stores). This issue: dip dying. BY VICKI BOUTIN



This craze, which is present in everything from hair trends to stationery, will have you wanting to dip it and dip it good. The trend: dip dying, of course! It has hit the scene in every aspect of design and fashion including Kool-Aid tinted locks, chic dipped vases, colourfully dyed linens, and hip spectrum clothing. Extremely versatile, this look can be very fluid and airy (think ombre) when created using dyes, or it can offer you a solid, linear motif (think colour blocking) when created using opaque mediums. Either way, the outcome is stunning. Go ahead, take the dip!

Virki

dip tip: heavier weight watercolour or mulberry.

TECHNIQUE: Fabric Dye Dip Dying

Fabric dye—a super pigmented colour medium that works wonders with just a little hot water. And it works with paper, too! Simply let your paper sit in the dye bath until the desired look is achieved. For a solid line of colour, like that on my cupcake liners, do a single dip. For an ombre effect, like that on my blue background paper, dip your paper gradually in stages.

lucky, lucky me

supplies PATTERNED PAPER, DIE CUT SHAPES: American Crafts; STICKERS: American Crafts, Bella Blvd.; GEMS: Doodlebug Design, My Mind's Eye; PAINT: Ranger Industries; FABRIC DYE: Rit; ADHESIVE: Scrapbook Adhesives by 3L; OTHER: Mulberry paper.

TECHNIQUE: Gold Dipped Feathers

Embossing is another dip-friendly technique. In this example, I created a faux-dipped look by heat embossing the tips of die cut feathers. Simply apply embossing ink, sprinkle on gold embossing powder, and heat set using a heat tool.

dip tip: for a more exaggerated look, add a second layer of embossing powder while the first layer is still hot and heat again



TECHNIQUE: Faux Dip Dye with Stamping Ink

For a dip dyed look, swipe different shades of water soluble stamping ink on a piece of cardstock. This approach is quick and easy and offers you handheld control over the final outcome.

give it a try!

step one

Pull your lightest shade of water soluble ink across your paper, followed by a medium shade directly over 2/3 of your already inked area (leaving some of the lightest shade untouched).



step two

Pull your darkest shade of ink across the lower third of your design.

Use a juicy ink pad for best results.



step three

Blend the colours slightly with a baby wipe to soften the lines where the colours meet, and set paper aside to dry.

BASIC SUPPLY | Cardstock

Try brushing the back of your baking soda to neutralize the adhesive. This makes it easier to layer your stickers with foam tape and create one-of a-kind 3D accents.

I've always enjoyed trying new techniques and seeing the creative potential my scrapbooking supplies have to offer. However, my family is growing (my first grand baby is due this year!), which means I don't always have time to spend hours on a single layout. I'm sure you can relate to the demands of life and the desire to also be creative and try new things. Wherever you may be at this moment in time, I hope one of my three page variations inspires you to still fit story telling into your life.



easy

supplies CARDSTOCK, PATTERNED PAPER, TRANSPARENCY SHEET, VELLUM: American Crafts; CHIPBOARD, LETTERPRESS PAPER, STAMPS, WASHI TAPE: Studio Calico; ENAMEL DOTS: My Mind's Eye, Studio Calico; LETTER STICKERS: Bella Blvd.; MARKERS: Copic, Sharpie; STAPLER, STAPLES: Ranger Industries; ADHESIVE: American Crafts, Scrapbook Adhesives by 3L.

Wanting to keep things simple, I opted for letter stickers on my easy layout. I also kept the embellishing to a minimum, allowing the patterns on my paper to act as the main decorative elements. For the grid outline, basic pen-drawn lines did the trick.

When I have a bit more time on

my hands, I often like to die cut letters for my titles, which is what I did on this layout. I'm also a big fan of machine stitching, so added time means I'm often sitting down at my sewing machine to add some stitched texture. In this case, the stitching replaced the pen-drawn lines forming my grid. By keeping some of my larger tools, such as my die cutting machine and my sewing machine out where I can access them, the additional steps didn't add that much time to my creative process.

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creative card techniques

Pushing plain cardstock to its maximum creative edge.

BY JENNIFER MCGUIRE

Who says you have to invest in an entire rack of patterned paper and cardstock in order to make beautiful springtime greeting cards? With these creative colouring and die cutting techniques, your basic cardstock is sure to spring to life.

you're the best

DIE CUT + SHADING

Add instant depth to any die cut design using nothing more than a few shades of grey. For the center of my die cut feathers, I created shadows using markers C1, C3, and C5-all shades of grey from Copic. This shading technique would also work well using coloured pencils or even a regular drawing pencil. It's amazing how just a little added colour can take a relatively flat die cut design and bring it to life.

make this card

- 1 Die cut feathers from blue cardstock. Add shading with grey markers. Start with the lightest colour along the entire shaded area. Work towards the center using the second and third shades, placing the darkest colour only along the center.
 - These three grey markers can add impactful shading to any coloured cardstock.
- 2 Die cut frame from white cardstock and rectangle from kraft cardstock. Adhere frame to kraft piece.
- 3 Stamp sentiment along bottom center of framed piece using embossing ink. Heat emboss using white embossing powder.
- 4 Trim piece from patterned paper and attach to card base. Adhere embossed piece to center of card.
- 5 Tie twine in double bow and adhere to card using dimensional glaze.

DIE CUT + MARKER COLOURING

Even the most intricate of die cut pieces can be transformed when using white cardstock and markers. This is especially true when the piece you're colouring includes a variety of shapes and will require several colours. Such is the case with the branch, flowers, and butterflies on this die. Did you know you don't have to use "blending" markers to blend colour? I simply added a lighter and darker shade, slightly overlapping the two shades where they meet (ex. the purples on my butterflies). Just like that, they're blended! This technique definitely works best with smaller surface areas like this delicate die.

make this card

- Die cut branch piece from white cardstock, colour with markers.
- 2 Die cut oval piece from white cardstock and stamp sentiment on piece using black ink. Adhere stamped piece to card base; trim away excess.
- 3 Adhere coloured piece to card base and add pearls.

STEP 1: Die cut "smile" from center of 4 x 5 piece of white cardstock. Set die cut word aside and add strip of tape behind die cut negative; replace "smile" so it's adhered in place using tape.



STEP 2: Colour "smile" sentiment using various shades of ink and sponge applicators or a blending tool.



STEP 3: Gently remove "smile" piece from tape and cardstock. Colour letters using shimmer pen.



STEP 4: To create a glossy finish, apply a thin coat of dimensional glaze to the inked word, and set aside to dry.



STEP 5: Die-cut small hearts and "smile" repeatedly from white cardstock and adhere to card as shown.



STEP 6: Adhere pink and black cardstock strips to card spine, and adhere "smile" at an angle to card base.

Wel<mark>c</mark>ome to *Spark Your Story,* my new column for 2015. Part of my goal with this approach is to inspire you to take a small spark of an idea for a story and then run

with it. In each issue, I'll present three layouts that emerged from one central idea. Hopefully it will inspire you as you gather your own stories.



rules for living #001

Create a list of your very own rules for living. What are the tenets of your well-lived life? What do you value? Think of things that are both silly and serious and keep an on-going list of these rules so you can add them to your albums from time to time. I keep my list of topics in an app called Evernote, which I can easily access on all my devices. Any time an idea pops into my head, I jot it down and refer back to it when I have a chance to scrapbook.

After years of being a memory keeper, I've learned the process of writing, photographing, and creating is an opportunity to share my beliefs and values by posing and answering questions. One question I've asked myself is this: What are MY rules for living?

I first started thinking about this question a couple years ago in my online workshop, Hello Story. I created two layouts that each showcased one rule. At that time, I also began a list of other topics stories to tell in the future when time allowed.

It's awesome that scrapbooking gives us a platform and a home for getting these thoughts out of our heads and recorded—which is meaningful in a variety of ways. I especially love that I can see my own thoughts evolve over time, because a rule I think is important today might not be as important tomorrow. Or it might be completely different based on new life experiences.



What are some of your rules for living life? This is the stuff that makes for meaningful layouts.

layout 1


ideas to note

1 The basic foundation for this layout is 4, 6" x 6" squares. Each square holds particular content: (1) pattern + title, (2) photo, (3) punched hearts with stitching on top, and (4) the story.

2 Punches are still cool! Choose four or five patterned papers and start punching. Layer the punches on top of each other, spreading out the patterns as you go. Adhere them down and then run the whole thing through a sewing machine for another layer of texture. Add chipboard or cork hearts on top using small staples.

3 I had trouble getting the colour right with this photo (it was really "warm"), so I changed it to black and white in Photoshop before printing.





layout 2

ideas to note

- 1 Use a digital layered template to simplify the process of gathering photos or cropping multiple images to fit.
- 2 A super simple way to mix things up is to rotate your photos so they are on an angle vs. aligned horizontally. Add small geotag embellishments plus the names of the places (or any identifying information) to help move your story along.
- 3 Go big with your title. For this title I hand-wrote "aka get outta Dodge," scanned it into my computer and traced it with the Silhouette Studio software before die-cutting.
- 4 Repeat the angle of your photos by having your journaling follow the same line.

rules for living #002

In my mind, I'm writing these rules with my kids as my audience, but this also works if you don't have kids and are just documenting what's important to you in your life. Be your own audience—there is so much value in simply stating your values and rules for yourself. You matter.

What I love most about this concept is that the story drives the layout. I begin with a thought—a rule for living—and then create my page around that concept. I look for images to include (or create a layout without photos) and I use a simple repeatable title card to go on all my pages that helps link them together.

aka: get outta Dodge



layout 3

ideas to note

- ① Don't not tell a story just because you don't have a photo to go along with it. I love including no-photo layouts in my albums.
- 2 Another way to go big with type is to find large letter stickers or phrases like the one I used on this layout, which is from Me & My Big Ideas. Phrases such as this can become jumpingoff points for your story. Look for products that act as story prompts to help jumpstart your memories.
- 3 A great use for washi tape is to add it around the outside edges of your layout. I often fold it in half but you could also cut it in half if you want to conserve tape.

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

Simple ways to get more of you into your scrapbooks. And yes, these are stories you need to be telling.

I'm passionate about several things. Among them are my family, rench fries and yes, you guessed it, scrapbooking my story. I've been scrapbooking since 2002 and I'm always surprised to meet women who don't make pages about themselves. It seems we put so much energy into telling everyone's story except our own.

I get it. I really do. Many of us get into scrapbooking to tell the stories of those we love. But I believe that including our own stories is a truly loving thing we can do for the people in our lives. It doesn't have to be stressful or weird, I promise. Here are three ideas for getting more of you into your scrapbooks.



layout 1

tip:make a repetitive list of "d" statements. It's a simple way to save a slice of your life right now.

Repetitive list journaling is one of the simplest ways to create an authentic story about yourself. This layout started with chipboard letters to serve as my prompt theme.

I created a text box in Photoshop Elements and simply filled in the blanks. If the thought of writing about yourself is intimidating or uncomfortable, this is a very direct way to approach it.

For the photo, I laid on my daughter's bed, handed her my iPhone and said, "Make me look adorable." It's hard to tell by the photo, but I'm in my pajamas and have zero make up on. We can get so hung up on looking our best that we avoid being in front of the camera. I think that's something we need to change.



Another way to tell your story is to make a page about your work. Whether you work inside or outside the home, documenting this part of your life tells part of the story that might otherwise be neglected.

What do you do? How long have you been doing it? How do you feel about the work you do? Would you choose the same path again, knowing what you know today?

Make visual connections

Create a visual triangle with colour and design elements to create a visual connection across your page. Visual triangles add unity and purpose to the design. The easiest way to do this is to find three embellishments from your stash and place them in a triangular relationship across your layout.



layout 3

tip:make a list of action words ending in 'ing' that tell a story of your life right now.

Every month on my blog I run a post called The Present Participle List. It's an opportunity for me to freeze the on goings of an average day in my life and preserve them for my posterity.

This is such a do-able approach to telling your own story. I challenge you to grab a pen right now and make a list of your own. What's happening in your everyday life? This is the very minutia of daily living that contributes to authentic pages reflecting who you truly are.

Creative typography

Try starting each line of your journaling with a •. different font. I used Halo Handletter for both my title and the first word of each sentence.

I increased the size of each word because the script font has a different X-height (the vertical depth of the

letters) than the journaling font. I set a generous leading (the space between the lines) to accommodate the swoopy descenders (the letters that dip below the baseline). Finally, I changed the colour to match the title strip for an added bit of cohesion.

There! That wasn't so bad now, was it?

If you haven't made a page about yourself in a while—or ever it's time to set aside a little bit of memory keeping time for Number One. I promise, it's not as scary as it may seem. Heck, you don't even need to use a bunch of photos (but I highly recommend including at least one). After all, photos of the storyteller are also part of the story. SCIX



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

- 3 Die cut stitched square from patterned paper and adhere to center of card. Stamp cross-stitch and swirl images.
- 4 Die cut stitched square from vellum. Tie ribbon around piece and add to card.
- 5 Die cut stitched square from white cardstock, stamp "hoppy easter" across the bottom, and adhere to card.
- 6 Die cut bunny from patterned paper, stamp with bunny image, and adhere to card. Colour the bunny's feet and nose using a marker. Colour the bunny's cheeks using chalk and a cotton swab.
- 7 Die cut a small doily from glittered cardstock and add to card. Die cut flower and leaf from felt; adhere. Add pearls.

- 5 Stamp sewing machine on card. Stamp sewing machine twice on patterned paper. Fussy cut the patterned paper sewing machines and add portions of them to the card. Colour sewing machine with a marker.
- Stamp sentiment and stitching on card and colour with a marker.
- 5 Staple chipboard Ms for "mom" to card. Stamp and trim heart for the "o"; adhere. Add pearl.
- Stamp flower, button, and leaf on coordinating scraps of patterned paper, cut out, layer, and adhere to card. Add sequin.
