





pic tips

Get shallow...with your depth of field. BY CATHY ZIELSKE

Welcome to Pic Tips! Here, we tackle tips, tricks, or techniques designed to boost your photography skills and how you put those skills to work on your pages.

what is it?

Depth of field is the distance between the nearest and farthest objects in a scene that appear acceptably sharp in an image. A shallow depth of field causes everything not in the selected focal area to blur.

aperture defined

Depth of field is controlled via the camera's aperture setting. The aperture determines how much light is allowed to reach the camera's sensor. On a DSLR camera, set your camera

to Aperture Priority (A or Av, depending on the brand) and dial the f-stop number down as far as your particular lens will allow. The lower the number, the more blurred the background. Focus your camera on a particular point in the foreground and shoot. Adjust the aperture setting for different levels of blur.

great for:

- □ isolating your subject against a busy background
- □ emphasizing any image's focal point



Simple Stories

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pocket play

Pocket scrapbooking is all the rage and we have solutions for your pocket dilemmas. By JESS FORSTER

sing pocket pages is like working on a puzzle with your photos, journaling, and page protectors acting as the pieces. Deciding what goes where isn't always clear, so I've put together a few tips that will help keep your puzzle play fun.





hello supplies JOURNALING CARDS, DIVIDED PAGE PROTECTORS:

POCKET TIP: Crop to cut. If you know you're going to cut a larger photo to fill several pockets, make sure your image is cropped and printed in such a way that the cuts won't end up being awkward (ex. across your subject's face).

On this Easter page, I really wanted to capture the story of my daughter dressed up as a bunny and participating in her

first egg hunt. I also wanted to give the page a spring feel and include my story. To fit these puzzle pieces together, I opted for a page protector with room for a sequence of photos as well as several small journaling cards, giving me the spring flavour I was after and providing plenty of room to document the details.




POCKET PROBLEM: Not having enough photos to fill two 12 x 12 pages.

POCKET SOLUTION #1: Cut your pocket page.

gasp I know this idea may seem intimidating at first, but page protectors are made to be used, and if that means taking a 12 x 12 page down to a 6 x 12, there's nothing wrong with that.

POCKET SOLUTION #2: Use an enlarged photo.

If you have more space to fill than photos to use, consider printing your favourite shot in a larger format and then cutting it into pieces to fill multiple pockets.





POCKET PROBLEM: Having more photos than space.

POCKET SOLUTION: Think beyond the pocket and create interesting add-ons.

On this springtime page, I wanted to include a title card, a two-paragraph story, and multiple photos. With only two 4×6 pockets to work with, I simply glued my two 4 x 6 photos together (back-to-back) and attached them to the journaling card in the lower pocket using clear tape. The paper clip cues the reader to flip the photo up to reveal the hidden journaling. Easy peasy! Not only is this a way to fit more in a smaller space, it also gives the pocket some dimension.

POCKET TIP: Want to use your computer to journal directly onto a card? Create a text box the size of your card, type in your journaling and print it out. Then adhere your journal card directly over the printed area and run it through the printer a second time.

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project: trend

You don't have to be a math genius to embrace the geometric trend that is taking the design world by storm. Graphic prints and patterns are showing up in all the latest fashions, in modern interiors, and all over the paper crafting world! When it comes to crafting, this shapely style is often illustrated in the form of a marvelous mosaic—geometric shapes pieced together to create a pattern or motif. It's like paper tile work! Let's take a look at a few nifty ways to make it mosaic.

TECHNIQUE: Using a Pre-made Kit

Effortlessly create a look that only looks pieced. Your shortcut: the Paige Kit Geometric by Pink Paislee. The background is a single piece of paper with the patterns positioned in a mosaic fashion. So you simply layer the white cut-out top to complete the design in no time.

TECHNIQUE: Geometric Die Cutting

Dying to try a paper-pieced motif but aren't sure how to approach the actual piecing? Look to metal dies designed to do the placement work for you (like this one from Maya Road). Cut from several different patterns and have fun mixing and matching your mosaics.

TECHNIQUE: Paper Tiling

Add texture to your tile work using the base and top coats included in the Paper Mosaic Kit by Ranger. It's a three-step process that opens up a world of paper and altered art possibilities. I've got the easy-to-follow instructions for you here.

give it a try!

STEP ONE:

Apply a thin layer of Grout medium to a chipboard shape using a palette knife; set aside to dry.

NOTE: Clean your knife immediately following use.



STEP TWO:

Trim "tile" pieces from paper and adhere to the chipboard using liquid adhesive and a paint brush. Seal the entire surface with a thin coat of adhesive and set aside to dry.

TIP: Add glue to the paper and the chipboard for the strongest hold.



STEP THREE:

Apply a thick coat of Glaze medium to each piece of paper, and set aside to dry.

TIP: Outline the shape first and then fill in the middle to control coverage.

 $olimits ag{out}$ ou don't have to invest in a bunch of fancy equipment or the latest trendy products to make an impressive two-page spread. Instead, reach for paper with classic patterns (stripes, dots, etc.) that never feels outdated. Also, look closely and you'll see shadowing on Stacy's design—adding foam adhesive is another easy yet effective way to jazz up basic paper. And it's hard to resist the lovely circles along the bottom. Nothing more than a few round embellishments (buttons and gems), a circle punch, and some paper scraps needed to re-create this bouncing border.

princess dress up tea party

TIP: To trim a curved edge that seamlessly stretches across two pages, first draw a line to follow using either a flexible ruler or a piece of twine as your drawing guide.

TIP: Punching vellum can prove tricky if your punch isn't sharp enough. A simple solution is to layer the vellum over a scrap of cardstock and punch the two pieces together.



on't be afraid to alter your transparencies and vellum. Just like patterned paper, these sheets will easily punch and cut. Yes, they ARE pretty but the things you can make with cut pieces are sure to capture your creative heart. And the added texture this type of specialty paper provides makes layering so attractive. Pull out a few sheets of paper and some of your patterned transparency sheets (like the polka dot sheets used here) and see what unique combinations you can create. Include a vellum layer for even more texture and sophistication.



TIP: Old photos aren't always sized according to today's standards. Create a custom photo sleeve to fit any pic using a sheet protector and a heat-sealing tool or your sewing machine.

eritage photos should definitely be treated with TLC. Ordinarily, we'd suggest making a copy to work with, just in case something were to *gasp* go wrong. If you really want to use the original photo AND highlight the precious writing on the back, we recommend placing your image in a photo sleeve. Attach one side of the sleeve to your layout so it will flip to reveal either side of the image without it being handled directly.

TIP: Give your flair a facelift by punching it and wrapping it with twine. Use an enamel dot or sticker to cover the hole and complete the look.

A FLAIR FOR FLAIR

Other ideas to consider:

- 1 Use flair as balloons on a birthday card or layout.
- 2 Replace the Os in a title or sentiment with flair.
- 3 Create a scene using flair (sun, tree tops, flowers, etc.).
- Add photo captions to flair using a permanent marker.

D adges, also referred to as flair, offer much creative potential. Don't be afraid to alter these embellishments to completely change their look. You can paint them, stamp them, or even punch them. A strong hole punch will go through metal, opening up all sorts of technique doors, including this happy string-art approach.

on't let the product description fool you. These little folders can do more than just basic embossing. We have not one but TWO ideas for taking this supply to new creative heights.

TECHNIQUE 1: Faux Letterpress

Before inserting cardstock, apply ink to the raised areas of the folder. Then insert the cardstock and emboss as you normally would. This transforms the folder into a two-for-one tool by making it a stamp. The ink will appear in the debossed areas (the hearts), creating a cool letterpressed look.

TECHNIQUE 2: Selective Embossing

It's hammer time! Only want a portion of an impression? Skip the embossing/die cutting machine and use a hammer. Gently pound only the areas you want embossed. Almost like masking in embossing form, this idea opens up all kinds of creative doors for your folders.

TIP: Hammer firmly but gently to avoid breaking your embossing folder, and make sure there's a hard surface beneath your folder.




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

Take a break from those straight borders and go for an incline. The sloped edge across the bottom of this scheme creates a fun change of pace on the otherwise linear design. To really play up the upward motion, follow Jen's lead and mix various textures in your layering. Her combination of punched paper, trim, decorative tape, vellum, and enamel dots takes her page up several notches.

TIP: Plant strips of journaling in an open area of a photo for a fresh way with words. Let a portion of the strips fall off the photo for an added anchoring element on the design.

There's nothing like the feeling of holding an entire story in my hands. That sense of accomplishment and the satisfaction that comes from creating something with a beginning and an end can't be beat. And, let's be honest, the small format is hard to resist.



MAKE IT TIP: Simplify your assembly process by limiting yourself to one or two coordinating product lines and use your embellishments sparingly. My go-to extras include enamel dots, washi tape, and stamps.

ALBUM ASSEMBLY

Creating a custom tag album is easier than it might sound. Follow these simple steps to build your book's base:

- 1 Trim a tag shape from patterned paper that is taller than your tallest photo (my photos are $3\frac{1}{2} \times 5$, so I went with a 6-inch tag). NOTE: Make sure you select a size that will also accommodate the width of your title.
- Use your first tag as a template and trim your remaining pages.
- Stack your completed tags together and hole punch. NOTE: Punch no more than three or four tags at a time to avoid shifting and misaligned holes.
- 4 Add reinforcement stickers around your punched holes.
- 6 Embellish as desired!

MAKE IT TIP: Give your album a nice chunky look by adhering your photos just a bit off center. This allows the elements to peek out from the sides when the album is closed, creating a glimpse of what's hidden inside. It's fun to think outside of those usual lines and parameters.





MAKE IT TIP: Consider creating an album kit before you sit down to create. Print your photos and pull pieces from your stash that support those photos. Group everything in a portable container that you can easily set aside between crafting sessions. Since mini albums aren't always completed in one sitting, this will keep your process smooth and organized.





MAKE IT TIP: Play up your layers. Mini albums aren't restricted to what will fit beneath a page protector. Have fun adding dimension and stretching your pieces beyond your pages.





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creative card techniques

Increase your sequin skills with these savvy suggestions.

BY JENNIFER MCGUIRE

Make those springtime greetings sparkle with sequins. This versatile embellishment is quite thin and comes in many shapes, sizes, and colours, making it great for so many cool card tricks. Here are just a few sequin techniques to try.

card 1

CUTTING SEQUINS

No special tools needed here. A good pair of scissors and strong adhesive are all you need to make a brilliant impact. Because sequins are round, when you cut them in half and line them up along your card, it creates a cheery scalloped edge.

- 1 Using light ink, stamp a background on peach cardstock.
- ② Die cut a wave from the stamped piece.
- 3 Adhere die cut pieces to white notecard, using craft foam to create dimension. NOTE: Be sure to leave a white space showing between the pieces for the sentiment.
- Mount the sentiment on an acrylic block with a curve to match the opening. Stamp onto card with black ink.
- 5 Cut sequins in half and adhere along the curved edges.

TIP: When working with sequins, use a strong adhesive, such as a liquid or small dots of glue.



TIP: Use small dies to die cut large sequins and create your own sequin shapes!

TIP: Cut sequins and place them in a little paper basket to create a cheerful Easter card.

STITCH SEQUINS

Sequins were designed to be stitched. Sure, you can machine stitch them in place, but why not make the most of the hole that's already in place and hand stitch them for a layered look? Call it stacking the creative odds in your favour!

- Watercolour a messy background on watercolour paper. Let dry.
- 2 Die cut stars from painted piece and adhere the stars to a cardstock panel.
- 3 Die cut sentiment from black cardstock and adhere to panel.
- 4 Trim a 2-inch piece of floss and double knot at the halfway point. Thread the two ends through a needle. String several sequins, starting with the smallest (so the knot lands in its center once threaded into place). Poke the needle through the front of the card, pull the floss tightly, and secure it in place on the inside of the card using tape. Repeat to complete the design.
- 5 Make card from cardstock and adhere panel.
- 6 Adhere tiny sequins using strong adhesive.

SEQUIN SHAPES

Sequins come in a variety of shapes, but they can also be used to make shapes. However, sometimes grouping sequins to make a shape can be a challenge—sequins are small and lightweight, which means they move on a whim. Until now. Here's a trick for placing your sequins precisely how you want them each and every time.

- Die cut sun from cardstock panel.
- Stamp "shine" using embossing ink, apply gold embossing powder, and set using a heat tool.
- Oreate a sequin-filled sun following Step Outs.
- Make card from cardstock; adhere sequin panel.



setting sequins in a shape



STEP ONE: Trace sun die cut onto the sticky side of a piece of masking paper or a sticky note.



STEP TWO: Arrange sequins upside down. The stickiness of the paper will hold them in place. Don't worry about open spaces; you can fill them in later (Step 5).



STEP THREE: Put small dots of strong liquid adhesive on each sequin.



STEP FOUR: Place cardstock piece down on top of sequins and press with your hands or a heavy book until glue dries.




STEP FIVE: Remove sticky paper and add sequins to open spaces using liquid adhesive.



STEP SIX: Layer embossed cardstock piece over sequin piece using foam tape to complete panel.

spark your Town

Add graphic appeal by playing with size on your layouts and pocket pages. BY ALI EDWARDS

When I prepare to tell a story on a layout or pocket page, I always have my title and journaling in mind. Sometimes the story is short (a couple of words or a sentence), sometimes it's really long (think paragraphs), and sometimes all I need are a few really big words to get my point across. I love having the flexibility to play with words as I tell the stories of my life.

layout 1

On traditional layouts, it's fun to play with really big letters to create either one word or a cluster of words. Large letters also work well when creating a phrase for your title. As an added bonus, jumbo letters offer an interesting place to add embellishments (like the heart and chipboard phrases used here).

IDEAS TO TRY

- Go big! Pair a full-page photo with large letters to really make a statement.
- When combining big letters, think about contrast between thick and thin. Also, play with different letter colours. Look to your photo for palette possibilities.
- Tell more of the story by handwriting additional information directly onto the photo in another area of the layout.

layout 2

On pocket pages, larger letter stickers or acrylic words make eye-catching embellishments when added directly on photos. You can think of these as page titles or as "the story" of any one particular photo. Sometimes they are fact words (like "dinner") and other times they are feeling words (like "love")— try playing around with both to tell a more complete story over the course of your spread.

TIP: You don't need lined journaling cards to add your own hand written touch. Instead, reach for a ruler (or not) and sketch your own lines. Stagger the lengths and don't worry about making them straight. The crooked aspect adds to the handmade feel.



IDEAS TO TRY

- 1 When placing stickers on photos, center them on the image or look for white space (such as the sky) to create a home for you word.
- 2 Use basic words that clearly represent your photo. For a clean look, use letter stickers that are all the same colour (white is my go-to).
- 3 Try varying the size of your words from pocket to pocket. Combining larger words with smaller phrases is a great way to create movement across your spread.

Understanding concepts of graphic design will help you create beautiful layouts. BY CATHY ZIELSKE

Welcome to Design Your Life, a new column dedicated to successful scrapbook page design. Why a layout works or doesn't work can often be attributed to your design choices. Throughout this column, I want to make the page building process simpler through design education. Design is simply a tool scrapbookers can use to create. Let's dive in and explore some concepts!



total besties

JOURNAL BLOCK TIP: Narrower text blocks are easier to read. Using ample leading (the space between the lines) adds further readability. I often take my type size and double it to determine the leading number. I then adjust from there as needed.

layout 1

SYMMETRICAL BALANCE

Symmetry occurs when you can slice a design down the center and what you see on the left is repeated on the right. This page features reflective and flipped symmetry. In other words, by splitting and flipping the title (one word anchored at the top on one side and the other at the bottom on the opposite side), balance from side to side is created. The small banners and heart embellishments also follow this placement on the page.

REPETITION

Repetition serves to create unity on any design. Here, the repeating embellishments (hearts), the title style, and the peach colour all connect the design. Repetition gives you a chance to play with your embellishments. Think about how can you place them on a page in a way that connects the main page elements (photos, journaling, and title).


One technique I use time and again is that of gathering content in the center of my 12 x 12 workspace. To make this successful you need to included plenty of "white" space to frame your content. Here, the background isn't white but you can see how the open space invites breathability and elegance to the page design. White space lends a timeless quality to any design.

layout 2

SYMMETRICAL BALANCE

Everything on this layout is centered/balanced, down to the photo placement. The even number of images (six) is the star of the design.

REPETITION

Colour is the big repeater. I pulled my hues from the paper and applied them my title and journaling.

TECHNICAL TIP: To match the colours in your paper, take a photo of your paper in natural light, open the image in Photoshop and use the Eyedropper Tool to take a sample of the colour. Apply that colour to your title and do a test print. Adjust as needed.

Unwrap ideas for sending the ones you love a little birthday cheer. BY MELISSA PHILLIPS

When it comes to the most popular card making occasions, birthdays consistently top the list. We all love the cute and versatile product out there, overflowing with balloons, confetti, cupcakes, and streamers. After all, everyone has birthdays and classic birthday icons are perfect for children, teens, and friends of all ages.

card 1

- 1 Create a 3¾ x 5½ card base from cardstock and round right corners. Cut plaid paper slightly smaller than card front, round right corners, and adhere to card.
- 2 Stamp balloons on white cardstock. For some, ink stamp, stamp on scrap paper, and then stamp cardstock without re-inking to create translucent effect (known as "stamping off"). Stamp dots and add enamel hearts to balloons. Adhere panel to card.
- Stamp sentiment on card.
- Oie cut hearts from pink and white cardstock and adhere.
- Die cut and assemble paper bow and adhere to heart. Embellish with a button.

hello birthday girl

MAKE IT MASCULINE: Create a darling card for a little boy by replacing the pastel plaid paper with primary colors and swapping the heart die for a star.

TIP: When stamping your balloons, overlap your images to create depth. And use coordinating colours for added pop.

card 2

Transform any motif to suit a birthday theme by pairing it with classic birthday imagery. I added balloons and confetti to a couple of bird stamps, instantly giving the design a celebratory feel.

- 1 Create a 4 x 5½ card base from cardstock. Adhere plaid patterned paper to front of card.
- 2 Cut white cardstock 3½ x 5 and adhere to card.
- 3 Die cut flower/hill border from orange and green sheets of patterned paper. Trim flowers from green version and adhere both pieces to card.
- 4 Stamp balloons and embellish with sequins.
- 5 Die cut three birds from white cardstock and stamp each on coordinating patterned paper. Paper piece each bird, mixing and matching patterns, using the white die cuts as bases. Adhere birds to card with dimensional adhesive.
- 6 Stamp sentiment and confetti and add trim.



love life

card 3

Create a mini card on a card. It's like the cherry on top of your design. Sweet!

- 1 Create 3¼ x 5½ card base from cardstock. Adhere heart paper and round bottom corners.
- 2 Cut white cardstock 3 x 4½. Adhere to card.
- 3 Trim chipboard banner to fit and adhere.
- 4 Die cut tag and adhere to card. Embellish with bow and sentiment sticker.
- 5 Create a small card (1½ x 2), round corners, stamp sentiment, and add cupcake and flowers.
- Trim patterned paper to fit inside mini card, round corners, and adhere. Add number stickers and adhere mini card to your card.

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





