





idea 1

Pocket page scrapbooking is one of my favourite ways to document my family's stories—old stories, new stories, big moments, everyday moments, and even collections of our favourite things.



flashback

supplies PAGE PROTECTOR, FUSING TOOL: We R Memory Keepers; JOURNALING CARDS, CHIPBOARD, RUBBER WORDS: Ali Edwards; OTHER: Shipping tags

BONUS TIP: Embellish the outside of your pocket page to break up the basic grid design and add visual interest to your page.

I love digging through photos from my childhood and

discovering remarkable similarities between my mom and me. That's how this page began. Seeing a shot of my mother in her coat prompted me to get a selfie in my own puffy, blue, winter wear. With the photos gathered, the story came together with ease. I love seeing these photos together!

TIPS

POCKET TIP #1: Go horizontal and vertical with your words. It's okay to mix and match the orientation of your text in pockets. It adds movement to the overall design.

POCKET TIP #2: If scanning is not an option or you're not happy with the quality of the scanned images, try photographing old photos (instead of using the originals). You can edit/crop/ enlarge them to the correct size on your computer or phone before printing them.

POCKET TIP #3: Customize your pocket page design with a Fuse tool or sewing machine and clear thread.

Meal times in our home can be really challenging,

but if there's one meal that's a guaranteed winner for breakfast, lunch, or dinner, it's pancakes. That simple fact makes this recipe an important part of our everyday life and a fun detail to include in our album. TIPS

POCKET TIP #1: Fill the pockets in your spread with a collection or series of photos that, when combined, tell a visual story. White foam board makes an excellent background when photographing a collection or series of objects.

POCKET TIP #2: Don't be afraid to combine different page sizes to best fit the story you want to tell. This spread is made with a 9×12 page (3×3 pockets) on the left and 6×12 full page photo on the right.

POCKET TIP #3: Tags are it when it comes to pocket journaling. They can be trimmed to fit within a pocket but also look cute sticking out of a pocket. Whether they're tucked in or stapled to the outside, they're an accommodating choice to consider.

Pom pom whimsy is here to brighten our days!

I've spied poms dangling from shoes and peeking out from day planners. It always makes me smile. With the holidays in sight, these balls of colourful confetti will add the perfect touch to gift wrap, Christmas ornaments, festive wreaths, and, of course, our paper crafts! Let's take a look at a few ways to add a little pom pom party to your next project.

TECHNIQUE: Pom Pom Garland

Get your pom on! String mini pom poms together using a needle and thread to create a puffy page border.

POM TIP: Mix and match a variety of pom pom types. Felt beads, fuzzy poms, tissue paper balls, and tulle bundles all hold great pom possibility.

TECHNIQUE: Pom Paper Clip

Whether you make your own poms and add them to paper clips or buy pretty, pre-made options like the one I used from Bella Blvd, a pom clip is a terrific way to add puff and texture.

POM TIP: When adding poms to scrapbook pages, opt for ones with a small poof that will still fit beneath a page protector.

STEP-BY-STEP



STEP ONE: Repeatedly wrap yarn around fork, tightly tie in center, remove from fork, and trim to create pom.

TECHNIQUE: Pom Piecing

Combine or decorate poms to make motifs. Just about anything with a round shape can be created. Pumpkins, a New Year's Eve ball, party lights... you name it!

dim the lights

STACY SAYS: To capture the true magic of holiday candles burning bright, turn off the lights and take photos without the flash. The light from the flames will provide enchanting illumination.

capture the action

MARLA SAYS: I love playing in the snow with my children. Taking action shots where I can see the joy and expression on their faces against a blanket of crisp white snow freezes those magical moments forever.

SAY CHEESE Take advantage of the bright reflective snow to capture the action. All of that light allows you to use a faster shutter speed and therefore stop the motion in an image.

SHERI SAYS: I love incorporating simple props and backdrops into my photos, especially those taken on holidays and special occasions. They help to tell the story while adding visual interest to the actual image. They are also an easy way to add a pop of colour when needed!

Then follow Sheri's lead and hang a banner or garland. For Valentine's Day, try punching a series of hearts and either machine stitching them together or adhering them to thread. It's a lovely way to use those paper scraps and make your photo surroundings shine.





go grayscale

VIRGINIA SAYS: I like to convert images to black and white when I'm scrapping close up pictures of people's faces. I find this simplifies the background colour and draws attention to cute facial expressions.

SAY CHEESE Create a background inspired by that special photo. Glitter paste adds sparkle and enhances the winter magic.

SAY CHEESE To create watercoloured die cuts, it's easiest to paint first. Create patches of desired colours across a sheet of paper and cut frames from each hue.

Isolating an aspect in an image with a separate coloured photo is a great way to add emphasis.

SAY CHEESE Make your focal image stand out further by matting it on cardstock and popping it up using foam squares.

MAKE IT TIP: Make those heart pages skip a beat

by alternating between solid and holed scalloped edges. The mixture makes the book more fun.

MAKE IT TIP: Use 6 x 6 paper pads for the pages in your album! Since the prints are often sized down and the patterns and colours coordinate, it's an easy solution that eliminates the guesswork.



MAKE IT TIP: Typewriters make journaling in minis a snap. You can even type directly on vellum for an interesting overlay effect!

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creative card techniques

Bring your cards to life with festive backgrounds.

BY JENNIFER MCGUIRE

It's time to take things back. Back to background techniques, that is!


No matter the sentiment you're sending, a beautifully designed foundation will make your card twinkle! I have three ideas to share that will get your creativity flowing!

card 1

MARKER PAINTING

Create a cool canvas using embossing supplies and a lively background stamp. The raised lines of the heat embossed areas will create small enclosures where you can capture and combine paint colours in a harmonious way.

- Stamp background on watercolour paper using embossing ink, apply white embossing powder, and set using a heat tool.
- 2 Drop water into the embossed areas using a paintbrush.
- 3 Scribble marker on acrylic block. Pick up colour with paintbrush and touch the colour to the water on the background. The colour will spread to fill the area. Repeat until the background is full of colour.
- 4 Trim and adhere panel to card.
- 5 Stamp and heat emboss sentiment on cardstock strip. Adhere strip to card.
- 6 Die cut thanks and heart from cardstock; adhere to card.



We're just getting warned up.



INKED & EMBOSSED VELLUM

Heat embossing on vellum creates a frosted feel, just right for winter. Bring such subtle elegance to life by also adding pops of colour to the vellum. Here's how you turn basic vellum into a sheer delight.

- Stamp background on vellum using embossing ink, apply white embossing powder, and heat set.
- 2 Directly apply three colours of ink to the back of embossed vellum using a sponge or blending tool. Wipe away excess ink and repeat until you've reached your desired colour saturation.
- 3 Adhere vellum to card by applying adhesive only where the sentiment will later be placed.
- 4 Die cut several snowflakes and adhere them together to create a single, stacked accent.
- 5 Die cut circle from cardstock and adhere to card. Adhere snowflake to circle.
- 6 Stamp and emboss sentiment on cardstock strip. Adhere sentiment to card. Add sequins.

card 3

DIE CUT INLAY

Filling a negative die cut piece (the piece left over after an image has been cut) with a die cut from another colour of cardstock is a classy way to make the most of basic supplies. Add embossing over the top to make the combined creation feel like a single, two-tone piece. Here's how this look springs to life:

- Create embossed, die cut inlay following the steps on page 39.
- 2 Die cut sentiment from glitter paper and adhere to card.
- 3 Add gems.

technique to try

CREATE A TWO-TONE, EMBOSSED BACKGROUND FOLLOWING THESE STEPS:



STEP ONE: Die cut deer from two shades of cardstock.



STEP TWO: Place darker deer in lighter cardstock frame, and secure in place by adding washi tape across the back.



STEP THREE: Stamp background image using embossing ink.



STEP FOUR: Carefully separate two pieces again and apply clear embossing powder to each piece.



STEP FIVE: Set embossing powder using a heat tool. Place darker piece back in lighter frame. Adhere panel to card.



spark your story

Propel your storytelling with one of my favourite phrases. BY ALI EDWARDS

I turn to story sparks time and time again. They can be questions (ex: tell me the story of a time you were brave) or they can be a phrase that prompts your story telling (today you... or currently...).

IDEAS TO NOTE

- 1 Use the sky in your photos as a home for your journaling and embellishments. Take photos with this in mind or use Photoshop to extend the sky.
- Embellishment clusters are an easy way to use your accents to move your story forward. I tend to create three on a page with 4 or more pieces per cluster.

layout 1

Love you because... is one of my long-time favourite sparks.

It is such a simple starting point, yet so very meaningful. "Love you because" can be about people you adore, but it can also work for places, things, and even memories. When I employ this story starter, I often use it in a list format. I simply move from one thought to the next, placing the phase at the beginning of each line. With this approach, I don't have to worry about paragraphs or flow in my writing. The repeated phrase makes it easy to get more of the story told.

My projects show how you can use "Love you because" on a traditional layout and within a divided page protector, such as Project Life, to tell your story.

My layout, which starts with an enlarged photo as the home for my story, includes journaling specific to my partner tucked in next to the two of us. I used Photoshop to add my text directly to my photo before printing it.

layout 2



I filled my divided page protector with a variety

of photos and used the story spark as a jumping off point to describe my affection towards the people, places, and things captured in the photographs. This was the first time I've actually used this spark on things rather than just people, and I loved it!

To make your spark stand out, look at ways to use it as an accent. In my case, I went with a printable, but you could also use your stamps to create a unique statement piece.

- 1 Create unity using accents. I consistently used the same style of embellishment on each 3 x 4 journaling card as well as on the photos, creating natural groupings. Repetition creates visual unity. This is such a great way to use your stash of supplies, too!
- 2 Incorporate real life mementos. I found this to be the perfect home for this heart tag I had been saving, which was a gift from Aaron.
- 3 When filling a page with many photos, don't forget to vary your photo angles. Straight on, slightly angled from afar, overhead shots the variety helps keep your overall design interesting and allows each photo to stand out.

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

Your best scrapbooking tool might just be your computer. A look at hybrid scrapbooking. BY CATHY ZIELSKE

I have been using my computer to make scrapbook pages since the very first layout I created back in 2002. For me, hybrid scrapbooking—combining computer processes with traditional ones—is as natural a pairing as Christmas and sugar cookies. Albeit, one with far fewer calories. I'm going to share my secret recipe for making standout hybrid layouts.



a story to remember

layout 1

SEE-THROUGH BOXES

I love the look of a block of text with a ghosted background. It allows you to read the text while also seeing the photo behind it. This is an easy technique to do in Photoshop. All you need is a photo with an open area large enough to fit your journaling. On my page, I put the box above my subjects' heads, which required a little creative cropping of the original image (turned askew to offer more room).

Using the Rectangle Tool (found under the Shape options in Photoshop Elements' Draw tools), I added a white rectangle on top of my photo and changed its opacity to 80%, which creates the see-through effect. Next, I added my first journal box, set my font style, and typed the journaling. I then copied the journal box and dragged the copy to the right to continue typing in a second column.

layout 2

Photo collages are a terrific time saver! Rather than print and trim all of these photos separately, I created one collage to print as a single image. Once the collage is printed (this one includes the journaling), it's easy to then go in and add embellishments!



DIGITAL SKETCHING

To design your page and incorporate other elements, create a digital sketch! I wanted to use this charming "Jingle all the way" cut file for my title. Once I created my collage, I placed the PNG file that came with the digital package and sized it to my liking. I then added my journaling, keeping it short so it wouldn't run into the title.

Using the built-in Photoshop rulers, I measured the vertical size of the title and when I opened the cut file in my electronic cut file software, I matched that size. Before printing the collage, I turned off the title layer so it wouldn't print. This left the perfect amount of space for my cut, cardstock title. I love the added texture it gives my hybrid design.



STEP ONE: In an 8½ x 11 Photoshop (or PS Elements) document, make a square box using the Rectangle Tool. Hold your Shift Key to constrain the box proportion.



STEP TWO: Drag a copy to the right by holding down your Alt (PC) or Option (Mac) + the Shift Key. Go to Edit > Fill Layer... and under Contents choose 50% gray. Repeat for box 3. Change colour to black.



STEP THREE: Shift + Click on all three boxes and drag a copy of the group directly below. Change colours to create a checkerboard effect. Repeat for a third row and fourth row.



STEP FOUR: Select all layers and size collage as needed. Add photos to your document and clip into each box using Control (PC) or Command (Mac) + G. Size and crop photos as desired. Print onto photo paper and trim.



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



- \bigcirc Make a $3\frac{1}{2}$ x $5\frac{1}{2}$ -inch card from cardstock. Adhere patterned paper strips to bottom of card.
- 2 Emboss white cardstock. Lightly sponge on tan ink to highlight the embossing, and adhere to card front.
- 3 Stamp and die cut trees from cardstock. Stamp sentiment across the center of trees. Die cut a small heart from patterned paper and adhere just above sentiment.
- 4 Tie twine around top portion of card.
- 6 Adhere wooden tree and stamped trees.
- 6 Add metal embellishments to the corners.

TIP: Valentines don't have to be centered around hearts. For a more masculine look, opt for motifs that support a play on words. In this case, the trees, plaid print, and wood play on a fun but loving sentiment.

- 2 Stamp large heart confetti in light pink on card followed by small heart confetti in bright pink.
- 3 Die cut a strip of bright pink patterned paper using the heart scallop border die and adhere to the bottom edge of a striped paper strip. Adhere to card.
- 4 Adhere polka dot strip. Stamp sentiment on label and adhere label to card using dimensional adhesive.
- 5 Embellish with puffy stickers and enamel dots.
- 6 Stamp bear on white cardstock using solvent or hybrid ink; emboss. Trim bear and colour. Highlight with glitter glue and adhere to card using dimensional adhesive.

- Oie cut layered hearts from cardstock and patterned paper, adhere layers together, and adhere to card using dimensional adhesive.
- Embellish with bow, banner, flowers, and small hearts.

TIP: Use small shaped stickers in place of sequins, such as the tiny hearts used here. They add the feel of scattered confetti without making the design too busy.



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
