# pic tips

## Tell more of the story with props. BY MEGAN HOEPPNER

You know the old saying—a picture is worth a thousand words. You'd think such an impressive word count would be enough. (Sure beats the 140 characters we're used to today.) But sometimes there's even more to say. When I want to add to my visual narrative, I turn to props and decorative extras. Such visual detail is a playful way to make photos



OH, BABY!

Monthly attire is an easy way to show growth during that rapidly-changing first year of life. I made my daughter's bodysuits using fabric and my die cut machine. To really emphasize the change taking place with each month, keep the rest of the photo simple and consistent. Use a common backdrop, such as a chair or blanket. Include a companion that will show growth. A beloved stuffed animal will appear to shrink before your eyes with each passing month! By keeping the surroundings the same from month to month, the personality and development of your sweet subject will shine.

TIP: As you re-create an image from month to month, don't hesitate to adjust your camera angles. The variety is a fun way to further showcase personality.

TIP: Photo documenting doesn't have to stop at year one. Apply the same tips to capture your child's growth at any ages. Pick a date, find a common prop/setting, and snap that shot!

#### **PROP TALK**

Anything that introduces added info (name, date, age, weight, etc.) to a snapshot will work to enhance your photo story. Here are a few prop possibilities to get you started:

- chalkboard with written details
- number balloons
- handmade or printed sign
- wood numbers or letters (like the "one" photo on my layout and card)
- felt letter board (see pg. 11 to see a brand new option by Heidi Swapp!)
- banners
- blocks
- decorated t-shirt (use fabric markers)
- decorated Easter egg (use wax crayon or stickers)
- light box sign
- marquee numbers or letters
- writing in the sand/snow
- sidewalk chalk

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# pocket play

From holiday to everyday—pocket scrapbooking is a year-round affair. BY KELLY NOEL

Pocket scrapbooking is my favourite way to document this crazy life of mine!

With three boys, there are many everyday moments to capture. These tend to be my favourite stories to tell. But the holidays rank right up there, too. No matter your theme, pockets are a great resource for quick yet creative storytelling.



Since I take so many photos on holidays, I like to dedicate an entire two-page spread to them. This Easter was a whirlwind for us since we had been on vacation the week prior. We packed all of our Easter activities into just one day! The two-page spread allowed me to then pack that fun into a single scrapbooking spread.

#### easter sunday

supplies PAGE PROTECTORS, INK, JOURNALING CARDS, LABEL, STAMPS, TRANSPARENT NUMBER: Studio Calico; DIE CUT SHAPES RUBBER SHAPE: Crate Paper CHIPBOARD: PinkFresh Studio; STAPLER, STAPLES: Advantus; FONT: American Typewriter

POCKET TIP #1: Spread the colour around! Make sure the hues used are equally balanced on both sides of the spread.

POCKET TIP #2: Use similar embellishments. Banner strips and labels are great for pocket pages, and they're even better when used throughout the spread to create a visual balance.

POCKET TIP #3: Don't be afraid to mix black and white photos with colour photos. Now that my boys are older, they resist being told what to wear. The days of cute coordinating outfits are long gone. Black and white photos to the rescue!



My approach to documenting our year is bi-monthly. A full spread represents a two week span in our lives, while a one-page layout represents one week. I love that this has taken the pressure off a bit. The project seems much more manageable this way. These photos were taken last May. We had a fairly busy week with Mother's Day and my husband's birthday on top of everyday happenings.

#### vou're rad

supplies PAGE PROTECTOR, JOURNALING CARDS: Studio Calico; DIE CUT SHAPES: Pink Paislee, Studio Calico; STICKERS: Crate Paper, Studio Calico; FONT: American Typewriter; ADHESIVE: Sticky Thumb

TIPS

POCKET TIP #1: Try alternating photos and journaling cards when planning out your design. It's a great way to create a visual balance with your photos and draw the viewer's eye across the page.

POCKET TIP #2: Don't be afraid to embellish! There are many great, flat embellishment options for pocket scrapbooking. Decorate your journaling cards with tags, die cuts, labels, stickers, etc.

POCKET TIP #3: Keep the visual triangle in mind when embellishing. Place embellishments around your page in a triangle fashion to keep your viewer's eye moving across the design. You can see how I used this concept with the die cut shapes and stickers on my layout.

POCKET TIP #4: If you have a journaling card that's too bold

for your taste, cut it in half! The card with the bold triangle pattern was too much for this spread, so I cut it in half diagonally and adhered it to a plain grid card. The new pairing tones down the overall look, while still allowing me to use the fun print.

POCKET TIP #5: A little bit of dimension adds a lot to a pocket page. Use foam adhesive to pop accents up. Try adhering elements directly to the outside of the pocket to avoid warping or wrinkling.







# mixed media made easy

It's time to mix it up, friends! Let's explore the world of monoprinting. BY VICKI BOUTIN

#### This year, I want to switch my column up a bit and head in a more artful direction.

Mixing mediums and combining techniques in all of my paper crafting pursuits is a huge passion of mine. At first glance, such techniques may appear complicated. They aren't! I will show you how approachable such art is. More importantly, you'll see how fun it is to get your hands dirty. Join me as we tap into our inner artists!



#### **ABOUT** MONOPRINTING

This technique is inspired by print making. Monoprint literally means "one print." It's an exciting way to make an entire printed background using a single colour application. And it's easy! Simply add paint to a sheet of plastic, create a pattern, and make a print. Even a novice painter can create splendid patterns.

## captured

supplies CARDSTOCK: American Crafts, Doodlebug Design; PATTERNED PAPER, ACRYLIC PAINT, DIE CUT SHAPES, PEN, STICKERS: American Crafts; ELECTRONIC CUT FILE: JustNick; ELECTRONIC DIE CUT MACHINE: Silhouette; GEMS: Darice; ADHESIVE: Scrapbook Adhesives by 3L; OTHER: Acrylic sheet

#### TECHNIQUE TIP: Have fun playing with

different patterns. In my example, I went with a brushed paint look. You could also create a circle (or circles), a heart, diagonal lines... there are so many possibilities. It all depends on how you apply your paint to the plastic.

#### STEP-BY-STEP



1 Add acrylic paint to a sheet of plastic in a desired pattern.



2 Mist paint with water. NOTE: Don't oversaturate or paint will get too runny.



Immediately place thick cardstock on painted layer and rub to transfer image.



4 Separate cardstock from plastic and set it aside to dry.

#### **TECHNIQUE: TWO-TONE PRINTING**

Now that you've mastered a single colour application, give the same technique a try using two shades of paint. The steps are the same. You simply add a second colour of paint to the plastic before applying it to paper.

NOTE: Act fast! You don't want your paint to dry before it's applied to your paper.

# make your own paper

Let your creativity bloom. All you need is a blank canvas, some watercolour paint, embroidery floss, and an image to work from. Whether that image is hand drawn, stenciled, or made using the drawing option on your electronic cutter, there are nearly limitless opportunities.

# gather memories

#### BY PAIGE EVANS

supplies CARDSTOCK: American Crafts; DIE CUT SHAPES, STICKERS: Crate Paper; ELECTRONIC CUT FILE: Silhouette; WATERCOLOUR PAINT: Loew Cornell; SEWING MACHINE: Brother; FONT: Remington Noiseless; ADHESIVE: American Crafts; OTHER: Embroidery floss



#### **BUILD THIS BACKGROUND**

Feel like a kid again as you colour your own stitched creation.



1 Draw a background on cardstock using an electronic cut file and your cutter's pen or pencil attachment. Pierce holes along lines.



2 Backstitch along pierced lines, using various shades of embroidery floss and a sewing needle.



3 Colour inside the stitched lines using watercolour paint or coloured pencils.

BACKGROUND TIP

# make a rainbow

Who needs the pot o' gold when it's the rainbow that truly shines? Grouping accents together by colour creates a striking design, while the white space helps your background breathe.



## the best

BY STACY COHEN

supplies CARDSTOCK: Bazzill Basics; STICKERS: American Crafts; DIES, ENAMEL SHAPES: Taylored Expressions; BAKER'S TWINE, GEMS, WASHI TAPE: Queen & Co.; FLOWERS: Prima Marketing; ADHESIVE: Scrapbook Adhesives by 3L

#### **BUILD THIS BACKGROUND**

Let your true colours shine with these easy-to-follow steps.



1 Adhere washi tape strips diagonally across your page.



2 Adhere twine in space next to tape using a liquid adhesive.



3 Add embellishments to create dimension and complete the design.

BACKGROUND TIP

## wash resist

No, we're not asking you to continue neglecting that pile of laundry. (Though, there are surely more exciting things beckoning.) Creating a wash resist simply means designing a surface that won't take watercolour. In this case, that comes from stamping and heat embossing.



### timeless love

BY BEA VALINT

supplies PATTERNED PAPER: Pink Paislee; STAMPS: PinkFresh Studio; STICKERS: Crate Paper; ADHESIVE: Scrapbook Adhesives by 3L; OTHER: Embossing powder, ink, watercolour paint, watercolour paper

#### **BUILD THIS BACKGROUND**

Make the many gorgeous layers found on this striking design in three basic steps.



1 Stamp cardstock with embossing ink, apply embossing powder, and heat set.



2 Mist paper with water and apply colour using watercolour paint.



3 Dip paint brush in paint, hold over background, and tap brush to create splatter effect.

NOTE: Once page has dried, you can then go back and add additional stamping detail.

BACKGROUND TIP

# embrace simplicity

Sometimes the best way to make a background standout is to leave it bare. Especially when you have tasty accents doing much of the talking! To add patterned paper behind such exaggerated embellishments would only work to sour such a sweet design.

3 Layer three pieces together to complete design.

# fill a shape


Like a punch straight to the heart... literally. This cute card's focal point was created by filling a heart with a variety of punched shapes. Note how the paper buttons are placed—they are positioned in a gradient fashion (warm to cool), with many shapes layered and overlapping.

Combing different textures adds interest to the page's starting point. In this case, I combined die cut paper with foam stickers.

Use your camera's burst mode to snap several photos in a sequence. Add those photos to your page in a strip to bring your story to life.

#### **JOURNALING TIP**

#### Know your type!

Type or print directly on your background cardstock for a simple and clean look. No fuss, no muss!

#### **EMBELLISHMENT TIP**

#### Get colour coded!

Cluster embellishments by hue. It's a fun way to use numerous accents without bogging down your page.


#### Bring on the border!







## creative cards

Your spot for card inspiration and technique how-to.

BY KIMBERLY CRAWFORD

While I love creating paper projects of all kinds, it's card making that's near and dear to my heart. When you create and send a card, you're telling the recipient they're special and sending a small part of your love across the miles. These small works of art can be customized to complement their recipients. My favourite way to do so is with stamps. No matter the occasion or person, you're sure to find a stamp that's perfect for you card creation!

#### card 1

- Make card from cardstock. Adhere patterned paper panel.
- 2 Die cut two banners from white cardstock. Stamp sentiment and adhere banner pieces to card.
- 3 Die cut a scallop circle and colour with ink using blending tool (or sponge).
- 4 Stamp and die cut sheep image. Colour sheep's face and legs using a marker.
- 5 Apply a foaming medium, such as Liquid Appliqué, inside the lines of the sheep. NOTE: Apply gently, as the product will spread.
- 6 Using a heat tool, heat the liquid until it puffs and turns white.
- Adhere sheep to card using dimensional adhesive; stamp hearts.
- 8 Thread buttons with twine and adhere to card.



#### ewe are loved

supplies CARDSTOCK: My Favorite Things; PATTERNED PAPER: Lawn Fawn; STAMPS: Paper Smooches; DIES: My Favorite Things, Paper Smoothes; INK: My Favorite Things; BLENDING TOOL: Ranger Industries; TWINE: May Arts; COLOURED PENCILS: Prismacolor; FOAMING MEDIUM: Marvy Uchida; ADHESIVE: Scrapbook Adhesives by 3L; OTHER: Buttons, marker

TIP: Create a horizon line by slightly overlapping the green and blue background ink. Use a sponge or blending tool to create this soft effect.

To see this sheep take shape, turn to page 53. It's a technique ewe'll love!



#### card 2

- 1 Make card from cardstock.
- 2 Stamp small dot background using embossing ink, apply white embossing powder, and heat set.
- 3 Die cut scalloped rectangle and adhere to card using dimensional adhesive.
- 4 Stamp and die cut flowers and leaves; adhere to card.
- 5 Stamp and die cut banner and "happy" and adhere to card.
- 6 Stamp sentiment on cardstock strip, notch end, and adhere to card using dimensional adhesive.
- 7 Stamp hearts around flowers with pale blue ink.

- Stamp and die cut fish.

- 5 Stamp and die cut remaining images; adhere to card. Adhere fish using dimensional adhesive.
- 6 Stamp wave lines using blue ink.
- Die cut banner, stamp sentiment, and adhere to card. Add sequins.

NOTE: See how gloss is used to make a stamped image pop on the next page.

#### TECHNIQUE 2: USING A STAMPING BOARD



1 Once stamp and paper are positioned on tool, ink stamp and close the tool's lid to stamp.



2 Ink outer edges of stamp in darker shade and stamp again. The tool will keep your stamping perfectly aligned.

#### **TECHNIQUE 3: ADDING A GLOSSY FINISH**



1 Stamp fish in three unique impressions and colours—grey image, orange image, and black image.




2 Apply dimensional glaze, such as Glossy Accents, to stamped image. It will dry clear, raised, and smooth.

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




# design your story

#### Learn how a little time travel can inspire the stories you scrapbook. By CATHY ZIELSKE

Welcome to my new column, Design Your Story! Stories are at the heart of why we scrapbook. Here, I'll be sharing ideas to help you document the memories that matter in new and creative ways. Sometimes, having a journaling challenge is all you need to make your next favourite layout. For this issue, we're going to look at scrapbooking spans of time. I adore this approach to storytelling and am excited to share a few helpful pointers. Let's go!



#### **lavout 1**

#### **COLLEGE MOVE-IN DAY**

I can't think of a more life-changing moment for any young adult than the college dorm move-in day. When my daughter left for her freshman year at a huge midwestern university, a whole four hours away from the home she'd known her whole life, we were in for a bit of a bumpy ride.

Two years and two school transfers later, she found her place at a small liberal arts college just an hour's drive away and the transformation has been wonderful to watch.

**STORY TIP: Combine multiple moments** on a single page. My story covers starting school... twice. By putting both of these big events together on a single layout, I'm able to share all the facets of my daughter's college journey. Had I kept these occasions separate, on their own individual layouts, I wouldn't have been able to get to the heart of what I wanted to say in nearly the same way.

#### you are here

supplies CARDSTOCK: Bazzill Basics; PATTERNED PAPER: Studio Calico; CHIPBOARD: Jasmine Jones; ELECTRONIC CUT FILES: CZ Design; FONT: Archer; ADHESIVE: Scrapbook Adhesives by 3L

#### **STORY TIP:** Write to your subject directly.

The words tend to come easier this way. Tell them what you see, what has changed, etc. **DESIGN TIP: Place all of your content right** down the center of the page to create a unified story block of photos and words.

#### layout 2

#### **BEFORES AND AFTERS**

After 17 years of living in our home, my husband and I decided to do a (ahem) little remodeling project back in 2010. The change to our home was nothing less than transformative on so many levels, but I had never documented the experience for our family album until creating this page.

**STORY TIP: Let your visuals do** much of the talking. When deciding whether or not to go the before-and-after route, think of your photos. Do you have visual examples of a transformation that has taken place? Pairing such pictures (instead of just showing the after) can make a bigger impact.

#### PHOTO TIP: Set up your digital photo library by year and month.

This makes it a cinch to then locate photos for pages celebrating annual events, such as the first day of school, holidays, and favourite seasons.

- 1 First day of school photos. My heart leaps seeing my children grow on this significant day each year. Especially as I compare childhood to their teenage years.
- Relationships. Take a photo of you and your significant other from when you first met and pair it with one from present day. What do you still adore about your special person? What has changed? What has stayed the same?
- 3 Family movie night over the years, or even just over the course of one month. What movies did you watch when your kids were little? How about as they have grown? You don't even need photos for these. Just snap a picture of the DVD (or VHS!) cases.
- **4** Document the change of seasons. From the same vantage point, snap a photo of your house or street four times over the course of a year. The outcome will be a great look at how your surroundings change with the calendar.



- 5 Adhere panel to card with dimensional adhesive.

- 5 Die cut scalloped border and adhere across bottom of card.
- 6 Attach sentiment sticker from kit to the center of a die cut banner and adhere to card using dimensional adhesive. Thread and attach buttons.

TIP: Save time using a kit. Card making kits take all of the guess work out of selecting your products. The colours are already coordinated, patterns selected to complement one another, sentiments waiting to be added, and embellishments at the ready. All you need to do is add your own creative touches to the mix!

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
