





A report on the latest trend-setting products that are hitting the scrapbook runway (and scrapbook stores!)

The walls and table tops throughout my home are covered with a variety of frames. They hold photos and memories that I never want to forget, and I cherish every one of them. So, I guess it is only natural that I gravitate to frame elements in my papercrafting, too.

By its very definition, a frame is a border or case that encloses a mirror or picture. On scrapbook pages, frames help to draw focus to your photos, and also add depth and dimension. What better way for your photos to say, "Hey, look at me!" than to embellish them with a frame.

I've created a few examples of how you can introduce frames into your papercrafting. Have a look and, in the spirit of Tim Gunn, "Use your frame embellishments thoughtfully and make it work!"



give it a try!

step one

Die cut an ornate frame. Position the negative pieces on white cardstock using temporary adhesive. In a circular motion, ink the exposed cardstock with dye-based ink using a sponge applicator.




steptuo

Select a large background stamp. Ink the stamp using the same colour of ink used to sponge in step one. Stamp the design over the entire exposed area.



stepthree

Using a shadow marker (such as Copic), draw the marker around the inside and outside die cut edge of the ornate frame. Remove the negative pieces and trim the piece to fit your card.

border punches

Decorative border punches are available in a wide range of styles, shapes and sizes, from continuous patterns to punch-around-the-page designs. American Crafts' Knock Outs come in an interchangeable border punch system that offers more than 18 styles, including scallop, notebook and bracket edges, as well as a set of six holiday borders.

Kelly used the Knock Outs Value Kit 1 on her vibrant, bold layout, creating stylish borders, snippets of decorative edges and a beautiful scallop frame around the white cardstock foundation of her page. She lightly frayed the edges of the notebook border below her journaling to give it a more authentic, torn look.

totally love you

Look closely and you'll see that Xelly alternated the colour of her faux pen stitches across the wide-striped black and white patterned paper.



border punch tips from kelly

- Maximize your creativity by using the positive, punched pieces. Those leftover strips have many creative uses on other projects.
- Layer varied-width punched border strips on top of each other using different colour papers for a unique border.
- For even, consistent punched borders, begin the punching pattern in the center of the edge you are working on.
- If one of your border punches is hopelessly jammed, pop it into the freezer for a few minutes. The cold will contract the metal and allow it to release.

nesting dies

A set of nesting dies comes in graduated sizes of one shape, in as few as three pieces or as many as eight to ten, depending on the intricacy of the shape. Nesting dies are great for layering die cut shapes, creating frames and silhouettes, and forming shaped foundations for stamped images.

Nicole used a combination of Spellbinders' circle and floral-shaped nesting dies on her colourful layout, creating positive and negative knock-out frames in a variety of sizes. She layered several die cut pieces together, in an offsetting placement, and attached them to the grey striped background paper using a sewing machine.



: live the life

Nervous to machine-sew on a layout? Draw faux per dashes to recreate the textured look of machine stitches.

tips from nicole for nested dies

- Combine multiple nested dies to create unique shapes, frames and cut outs.
- When die cutting more than one die at a time, secure each nested die to your paper with light-tack tape or washi tape to keep it from shifting.
- O Don't shy away from stacking elements onto each other to create a new pattern or shape. Vary the size and die shape to create a whole new look.
- For a graphic result, combine similar shapes together using the same paper or cardstock.

paper flower wreath tips from emily

- Before assembling die cut flowers, curl the individual petals over and under using your thumbnail or a pencil.
- Crease the center of cardstock leaves for added dimension.
- Ink sponge applicators work great for adding a blush of colour to the centers of flowers.
- When using decorative pins to attach flowers to a wreath, dip the end of the pin in a bit of glue first.

metal die shapes

With virtually thousands of metal die shapes available, the question you might ask yourself is, "What can I not create with a die?"

In celebration of the arrival of spring, Emily chose to create this stunning floral wreath, made almost entirely of paper flowers created with metal die shapes from Sizzix. To begin, she wrapped a foam wreath form with burlap strips. After covering it with dozens of paper flowers, she added transparent, printed butterflies, metal and cardstock leaves, and lots of beads and pearls. The results are outstanding!





large daisy
"This large daisy is the focal flower on the wreath and was my favourite to make. Before assembling the layers of each flower, I rubbed a darker shade of chalk onto each center. As you glue them together, be sure to alternate where the petals lay to form a fuller flower. To create the beaded centers, I used a dime-sized puddle of Aleene's Fast Grab Glue, sprinkled on seed beads until the glue was covered, then moulded the beads into a mound. Once dry, I glued the mound to the center of the flower."



3d rose

"This is a roll-up style die cut and is easy to make. By controlling the tension as you roll up the flower, you can make the rose larger or smaller. Starting on the outside end, I began rolling the die cut around a wooden skewer and continued rolling it onto itself to form the center of the flower. After about a third of the die cut was rolled up, I removed the skewer so I could achieve greater control of where the petals were being placed. The die cut ends on a small circle, which I attached to the bottom of the rose with a glue dot. I added the rose to the wreath form with a pearl-head pin."



3d flower cup
"This roll-up style flower is shaped a bit differently than the 3d rose, but the assembly is the same. To control the size of this larger flower, I used a pencil in place of a wooden skewer. Because the center opening was bigger, I was able to fit a raspberry bead in the middle of the large flowers."





With a square punch and a corner rounder, Xinber created a beautiful geometric flower pattern on her card.

punch & die tips from kimber

- When you die cut a shape, you will have a positive and a negative image. Don't throw away the negative piece. Instead, back the open space with contrasting paper and create a second embellishment.
- When using small, intricate dies, rub the die with waxed paper before cutting to help the shape easily release.
- To sharpen a dull paper punch, punch the shape several times through a sheet of 200-400 extrafine grit sandpaper.
- Use a hard, flat surface to punch on and, for better leverage, stand above your work surface.

purch & die combinations

Like peanut butter and jelly, dies and punches go together really well. They both create the same result—one positive and one negative shape—but one uses a machine and the other uses (wo)man power. Since punches came along well before dies, chances are you have many well-loved punches in your tool collection. Get them out and pair them up with a few of your favourite dies, like Kimber did here, to create both of these eyecatching cards.

On her "Happy Note" card, Kimber rounded opposing corners of all four squares then punched a row of uniform holes in each of the green ones. She attached them to her card using dimensional adhesive.

A binding punch border trims the top of Kimber's "Special Day" card. After die cutting the stars from graph paper, she backed the negative piece with red patterned paper and attached it using dimensional adhesive.

shape punches

Of all the types of paper punches available today, there is no doubt that shape punches are the most popular. They are available in the widest variety, from very small to jumbo-sized, and in shapes to fit every style, theme and project.

Sheri used an assortment of large and small banner punches, together with a heart-shaped punch, to create her heartfelt layout. She layered, clustered and combined the punched shapes with other embellishments for a really great, cohesive look.

The next time you use punches or dies on a project, remember these creative ideas and helpful tips from our designers! SCTK

- If your paper punch jams or sticks, punch it several times through a piece of waxed paper.
- If you have a very small punch shape that you will want to add a brad to, pierce the center hole before you punch the shape out.

With so many styles of washi tape available, a papercrafter could quite literally create a garden full of flowers. Anabelle's page is brimming with blossoms, all made from beautiful washi tape.

To create her beautiful flowers, Anabelle unrolled a length of tape and folded it back on itself, leaving patterned tape on both sides. She folded pleats, about one inch apart, down the entire strip. After punching out a small cardstock circle, Anabelle applied hot glue to the outer perimeter and attached the folded strip, fanning it out around the circle. To finish these beautiful flowers, she topped each off with a small button.

Give Anabelle's washi tape flower design a try and your projects will bloom, too!






Look closely and you will see that Anabelle attached her photo to the page using dimensional adhesive. She was then able to tuck additional flowers underneath the photo. What a great look!






easy, detailed, expert

Whatever level of difficulty appeals to you, our easy, detailed, expert column has fantastic ideas to try today!

When faced with a scrapbook project, personal schedules often play an important role in determining how much time you can spend creating a page. I kept this in mind when working on the layouts for this article. As you can see, the detailed and expert pages are clear variations of the easy page, with each layout requiring more skill to create. The beauty of showcasing a layout in this way is that no matter what your time frame, style preference or skill, each page remains inspiring and fun to make. As you follow the creative journey, I hope you will be prompted to try all three layout styles for yourself.

For the easy version of my page, I created a loose, grid-style design that offered many embellishment options. Quick layering and simple accents enhance the photographs and pops of colour ground the design visually. The use of tabs, washi tape, sticker sentiments and an arrow motif draw the eye horizontally across the page, nudging the reader towards the journaling. The addition of an oversized vellum pennant shape is a subtle way to add extra visual interest and lends importance to the focal photo in the veneer frame.



For the detailed version, I spent a little more time personalizing my page accents. By combining multiple layers of patterned paper and incorporating several stamp designs, I was able to add activity and energy around the page. The beauty of do-it-yourself accents is that they can be tailored to suit your theme, all the while contributing great pizazz without requiring too much extra time or skill. I finished off this page with faux-stitching, yellow sequins and touches of splattered blue spray ink.

fabulous amazing moment

For my expert page, I added random patches of rough texture using fiber paste and a stencil. Wet media is one of the most effective ways to add inexpensive detailing to any papercrafting project. Once dry, I used water-based paints and a watercolour brush to wash in similar hues. Black accent points add wonderful drama and subliminal stepping stones to the page, enticing the reader to discover something new. White machine-stitching rounds out my expert page.

- 1 Make a 4.25"x5.5" white card base, with opening on the bottom. Round bottom corners.
- 2 Trim a 4"x2" piece of peach paper. Adhere to top of card, centered and leaving a narrow mat on top edge.
- 3 Trim a 4"x2" piece of coordinating paper. Round bottom corners. Adhere to bottom of card, centered and leaving a narrow mat on the bottom
- 4 Trim a 4"x3.5" piece of green chevron paper and mat it with a 4"x3.75" piece of white cardstock. Adhere to center of card as shown.
- 5 Trim a 4.25"x1" piece of white cardstock. Notch end to make pennant. Stamp leaves image repeatedly onto the pennant with light green ink. Stamp sentiment onto right side of pennant and adhere to bottom of chevron panel.
- 6 Die cut a white circle. Before removing die, sponge green ink onto white circle. Remove die.
- 7 Using black ink, stamp images of a poppy and leaves onto white card-
- 8 Using Copic markers, colour the flowers with R32, R30 and R0000. Colour centers with W07, W05, W03, W00. Accent center with white
- 9 Colour leaves with G46, G43, G40 and G20.
- 10 Cut out flower and leave with fine-tip scissors. Adhere leaves onto circle. Layer flowers over leaves and adhere with dimensional adhesive. Adhere circle as shown.
- 11 Accent area below circle with two sizes of enamel dots.

- 3 Die cut a large label from white cardstock. Before removing die, sponge blue ink onto label to create mask. Using blue ink, stamp background image off left side of die cut.
- 4 Stamp flower stem and leaves onto white cardstock. Colour flowers using Copic BG57, BG53, and BG0000. Colour center using Y21 and Y35. Colour stem and leaves using G46, G43, G40 and G20.
- 5 Cut out flower and leaves. Adhere leaves using glue dots. Layer flowers over leaves. Adhere with dimensional adhesive.
- 6 Punch a 1" scallop circle. Stamp with sentiment in blue ink. Tie twine to stem of one flower as shown.

- 3 Trim a 1"x4.25" piece of green chevron paper. Wrap with pink seam binding. Secure binding on back.
- 4 Computer-print sentiment on white cardstock. Die cut sentiment with a small label die. Adhere to back of chevron piece, offset to the right as shown. Die cut large label from polka-dot paper. Trim bottom edge. Adhere to card with bottom edge of label flush with top of green embossed piece.
- 5 Layer green/ribbon piece between embossed pieces as shown. Create a bow and attach to left side of ribbon with a glue dot.
- 6 Stamp a large flower and leaves on white cardstock. Following step-out instructions, colour flower and leaves.
- 7 Cut out flower and two leaves. Using glue dots, secure staggered leaves. Adhere coloured flower, as shown, with dimensional adhesive. Accent rounded edge of large label with rhinestones.

Blend with R0000, making sure to work over any lines that the markers have left behind. Touch up with R00 to deepen the shade.



Prep your leaves by colouring the entire image with a blender pen. Add G46 to the base of each leaf. Use this colour sparingly.



Using G43, bring colour further onto the leaf.



Using G40, bring colour toward, but not completely to, the leaf's edges.



Blend using G20.



Document your authentic life: the legacy we leave our family by ALIEDWARDS


Language allows us to reach out to people, to touch them with our innermost fears, hopes, disappointments, victories. To reach out to people we'll never meet. It's the greatest legacy you could ever leave your children or your loved ones: The history of how you felt." -Simon Van Booy

Do you think about the legacy you are leaving when you work on memory-keeping projects? The word legacy gets thrown around quite a bit. For some, it's the absolute essence of scrapbooking and is factored into every decision. For others, it is an added bonus to the creative process of combining photos, products and stories.

To be honest, I don't think about legacy very much when I am scrapbooking. Most of the time, I am just telling a story or documenting our daily lives because I enjoy the process and the instant gratification that scrapbooking brings with it. I am not consciously considering what it will mean to others in the future.

As I began working on this article, I looked up the word legacy in a dictionary, wanting to know how it was defined. Here is one of the definitions I found:

noun anything handed down from the past


Usually, when I think of something handed down I think of furniture or jewelry or other family treasures, but oh, how I love the idea of handing down words and feelings.

Our words are so very personal and something only we can give to future generations. What was most important to you while you were on this earth? If you don't write it down, will anyone else ever know how you felt? Will you remember?

I am the kind of person who learns about me by writing things down. It's a way I process life's experiences. Creating layouts detailing your personal legacy is a very intentional pursuit. It involves thinking about what has been most important to you in your life and then taking the time to make a written record of it.

My personal legacy pages usually end up being my most-loved pages because they communicate something very specific. On these pages I choose, very specifically, what I want people to remember about me.

Giving the gift of recording life in your own words is something you can start doing right now. Don't waste precious time or space. This is your life and future generations will appreciate knowing how you lived it.



design ideas

- 1 This layout could easily be two 6"x12" pages or a single 6"x12" page included in a pocket scrapbook.
- 2 For added interest, combine different font sizes when your journaling is lengthy.
- 3 Convert your photos to black and white when your original colours are off. I scanned and enlarged this photo using the original (which was very orange), then converted it to black and white in Photoshop.

idea 1: you should know

Scrapbooking while recording your legacy is a great opportunity to include more words than you normally would on a layout. I don't always include so many words on my layouts, but when I look back at all of my pages, legacy pages are the ones that I tend to love the most because they include more of the story.

When looking for ways to tell longer stories, one of my favourite techniques is to establish a specific theme or ask myself a question such as, "What should you know?" and then create a list of responses. For this layout, I created a list of things I wanted my kids to know about me. Some are silly, some are serious, but the common denominator is that they are all specific details and facts about my personal life experiences.

You don't need to have kids to create this type of layout. I love the process because I often come up with memories and facts about myself that I had almost forgotten. What makes your life experience unique? What makes your story your own? These are great questions to answer in a "What You Should Know" layout.



idea 2: who are you?

Who are you? How do you want to be remembered? The term legacy does not have to mean serious or sad. It can be silly or fun or lighthearted. It can be a combination of anything you choose as long as it is a reflection of you.

You don't need to limit your legacy to a single layout. You may create several pages over the course of your lifetime that include lessons you've learned or new ways of thinking about yourself and life's circumstances.

I love the "I Am" style, where you create a list of different statements that describe yourself and define who you are and what you care about at a specific point in time. Remember, these pieces of our lives ebb and flow, often changing throughout the course of our lives. They are definitely pages that should be repeated over the years as life changes.

design ideas

- O Go big with your title. Use letter stickers, die cut your own letters or choose a very large font size, if you want to add your title digitally.
- 2 Use a combination of handwriting and stamping on labels to capture pieces of your story.
- 3 Rather than a simple numbered list, try using labels for each entry on your list.
- 4 A great alternative to the labeled list is strip-journaling, especially when you have a lot you want to say.

idea 3: be you


If you were gone tomorrow, what would you want your kids or your other loved ones to know about how you feel about them? One of my favourite ways to approach memory keeping is to write love letters to my kids. Using scrapbooking as a medium to express my love is part of my personal legacy.

Scrapbooking is an opportunity to do more than simply record family events. It is a chance to record your own legacy, both for those you love and for future generations. I encourage and challenge you to create one layout this year that tells a part of your personal story - your legacy.

- Using strips of text/sentiment patterned paper or washi tape create a border around your page. Add zig-zag stitching on top for additional texture.
- ² Hand-draw your journaling lines. Use a variety of pen sizes for the lines.
- ³ Use the white space in your photos for titles, embellishments and journaling. Don't be afraid to cut into your photo to create a home for your embellishments, like the diamond created on this layout.
- 4 Add glittered embossing powder to elements like I did with the wood veneer diamond shape.
- Trim die cut patterned paper to create a title and add a patterned transparency on top for added interest.





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pocket-style scrapbooking

With a few photos, memorabilia and an assortment of die cut cards and embellishments, you'll be on your way to pocket-style scrapbooking success

As a busy mom and wife, along with working full-time, some days it feels as if life is flying by at the speed of light. My daughter is a freshman in high school, and her days are filled with extra-curricular activities, social events and teenage adventures.

When I first discovered pocket-style scrapbooking, I realized that this system of memory keeping was the perfect solution for me to document my family's activities and everyday life. Add to that a terrific husband who snaps photos of happenings when I can't be there, and it's a creative match made in heaven!

So what is a pocket page you ask? Imagine a page protector, like the ones you slip a 12x12 layout into, except it is divided into a variety of different-sized pockets. These pockets are designed for you to slide in photos, journaling cards, die cuts, embellishments and memorabilia. The pockets load from either the top, left or right sides, and come in many sizes such as 2"x3", 3"x4" and 4"x6", just to name a few.

Pocket-style scrapbooking is so flexible! With one pocket page, I can document a full day or a full week, depending on the number of photos and memorabilia I want to include. Not only is this style of scrapbooking great for documenting everyday life,

but it's also perfect for creating theme albums




- → I have discovered that pocket scrapbooking is perfect for photos and stories that you may not feel are "significant" enough for a traditional scrapbook page.
- → I am a sucker for pretty paper and artistic designs. When the two come together on a premade die cut card, I love to slide one into a pocket and let it stand on its own, like the "Happy Days" card on this page. Don't feel compelled to make each pocket a masterpiece.
- → Use the dead space in your photos to add titles using letter stickers, stamps and rub-ons.

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- → Die cuts are a big part of my supply cache. They are a quick and easy way to add interest and dimension without adding bulk to the pocket. If I choose an embellishment thicker than a quarter (like wood veneers, badges or flairs), I usually place it outside of the pocket to avoid buckling.
- → I like to paint the edges of all of my photos using acrylic paint and a dry foam brush. It helps the photos to pop and the paint colour unifies all of the elements on my page. Chalk ink would work great, too.
- → When using a premade die cut, quickly doodle around the edges with a journaling pen as I did on the "Bowl of Cherries" die cut.

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- → Pocket-style scrapbooking is very forgiving. I love that I can try a new technique and not worry about ruining an entire 12x12 layout. If I don't like how the technique turned out, I can create something else for that pocket.
- → Small envelopes, like the kraft one I used on this page, are ideal for holding memorabilia such as ticket stubs and boarding passes.
- → Don't overthink the journaling process with this style of scrapbooking. Since I usually have more than one spot on a page to record the details, I keep my journlaing fairly quick and simple.
- → You know those 1/2" patterned strips found on the bottom barcode strip of many 12"x12" patterned papers? Cut them off and save them! They make perfect flags, arrows and pennants for your pocket pages.
- → I'll often find a perfect chipboard element, but it's too thick for my pocket. Rather than ditching it, I simply peel off several layers of chipboard from the back to thin it down.

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- → I mentioned in an earlier tip that the dead space in a photo is a great spot to hold a title, but I also like to write my journaling in these open spaces. Depending on how light or dark my photo is, I will use a smooth-writing permanent pen or a white gel pen. Be sure to let the ink dry before sliding the photo into a pocket.
- → I consider all of my pocket pages a "work in progress," meaning that I can change out pocket contents, rearrange the order or add to them at any time.
- → Just like traditional scrapbooking, you do not have to create your pocket-style pages in any specific order. You might start out creating daily pages, then switch up to weekly. Mix it up and have fun with the process!

One thing I loved about this system right from the start is that I found myself less intimidated by a few individual pockets than an entire blank 12"x12" piece of cardstock. Give it a try and you, too, may find yourself caught up in this trendy craze called pocket-style scrapbooking!
