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



A report on the latest trend-setting products hitting the scrapbook runway (and scrapbook stores).

With the winter months upon us here in the northern hemisphere, the days are getting shorter and the temperatures are falling, giving way to the first signs of frost and snow. For me, the chilly months mean more time in my craft room!

A "cool" product that blends seamlessly with winter projects is vellum. This semi-transparent, non-porous paper is perfect for adding a frosty look to layouts and cards, and its smooth, translucent quality is a great substitute for transparencies.

Read on to discover ways you can incorporate vellum into your projects all season long.

Vicki

Double-punch circles and back the negative space with vellum to create a "frosted" window.

you+me

step one

Die cut a shape from vellum. Using pigment or chalk ink and an inking sponge, ink the back side of the die cut and heat set it. Turn the die cut to the front.



steptuo

In a pouncing motion, apply a light coat of embossing ink to the front of the die cut. Sprinkle it with blue-green embossing powder and heat set the powder.



step three

Repeat step two using white embossing powder. Designer note: Do not cover the entire die cut shape with embossing powder. Let portions of each layer show through.

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petite packs a punch

6x6 paper pads: small in size but huge on creativity

They are perfect for making cards and mini albums, but what about 12x12 scrapbook pages? Grab your 6x6 paper pads and read on to see what you can create using these downsized sheets.

In the world of papercrafting, the versatility of a 6x6 paper pad is virtually endless. It is a go-to staple for those who make cards, artist trading cards (ATCs) and mini albums, but what about the traditional 12x12 and 8.5x11 scrapbookers? The paper is too small, you say? Not so! Read on to see how our designers make creative use of this mini version of paper in their full-size projects.



create a paper quilt

Nicole is our resident stitcher extraordinaire, and this 6x6 challenge provided the perfect opportunity for her to create one of her trademark paper-quilted patterns using mini sheets in place of her go-to 12x12 variety. Here's how you can recreate her look.

- 1 Die cut nine 1" squares from a variety of 6x6 sheets
- 2 Adhere the 1" squares onto white cardstock in a nine-square grid.
- 3 Nest two circle dies (2.75" and 1.5") together to form a ring. Place the nested dies over the nine-square grid, securing in place using washi tape. Die-cut a ring. Repeat steps 1-3 until you have 12 rings.
- 4 Adhere the 12 rings in four rows of three to the left side of a sheet of white cardstock, with each edge touching, as shown.
- 5 Machine-stitch double rows of stitching, horizontally and vertically, forming a stitched square inside each circle.

Because the patterns in a 6x6 pad are often 50% of the original 12x12 size, they are much smaller and more densely distributed, making them a great choice for this type of technique.

heart full of love

paper quilting typs from nicole

- **★** To make quick work of a repetitive design (like my rings above), use dies or punches of equal size and shape.
- * Keep the shapes simple, like circles, squares and triangles.
- **★** For an authentic quilted look, stitch over the seams where two pieces of paper meet.
- **★** When using several different patterns, choose one that unifies all of the colours and repeat it in each quilted
- **★** Enhance the quilted look by stitching around, across and through each shape.



create photo foundations

As you work with 12x12 paper, you may find the scale of the patterns to be quite large or busy, which can complicate photo and embellishment placement—you don't want overwhelm your design. When this is the case, turn to the 6x6 counterpart, which often sizes down the bold patterns you love, making it easy to then cluster and layer over them. Lisa's well-designed double page is a great example of this.

Lisa trimmed out elongated rectangles from a variety of patterns and arranged them across the center of her kraft base to form a colourful rainbow. On each rectangle, she added a photo, several coordinating embellishments and strips of white journaling. Each section is like a small canvas on which she developed a design, carrying her goals for 2015 across the page. The entire row is unified with the addition of scalloped strips across the top and bottom edges and sewing details stitched in black thread.

We love the tone-on-tone title that Lisa created and split into two parts. Not only is it eye-catching, but the neutral colours maintain focus on her core design.

create a pocket page

With only a 6x6 paper pad and and a few packages of embellishments, Virginia was able to create this beautiful, well-designed pocket page! If you are just getting started in pocket scrapbooking, a 6x6 paper pad is a must-have resource to include in your arsenol of supplies. In fact, you will discover that it can often take the place of pre-printed journal and title cards, as Virginia's page demonstrates.

Virginia filled each of the pockets with a trimmed piece of 6x6 patterned paper, then designed each section, one pocket at a time. We love her easy, stress-free approach!

6x6 pocket page tips from virginia

- ★ Because 4x6 is a common pocket size, 6x6 pads are a natural choice. Simply trim off two inches and you have quick and cute insert.
- **★** Designer motifs and larger graphics make a great foundation for creating a title element. The preprinted tree that I used for my "Happy Holidays" title pocket was the perfect proportion.
- **★** Take the extra step to mat your photos using 6x6 sheets. Again, because of the smaller scale of the patterns, you'll be able to see them, even on thinner borders.
- **★** Don't be afraid to place embellishments directly on your photos. The dead area or white space of a photo is the perfect home for small labels and letter stickers.
- ★ Look for 6x6 paper stacks that included lined and grid patterns, which make for easy journaling spots.



Virginia was able to create a dimensional tree design by adding low-profile enamel dots and sequins to a trimmed piece of patterned paper.



create a grid layout

A grid design is one of the easiest page formats to create and is a popular style amongst clean and graphic scrapbooking fans. But the design doesn't have to be linear or perfectly designed horizontally or vertically to be considered a grid layout. Summer tilted her grid design 45 degrees and the result is stunning! Even better, all of her patterned squares came from a 6x6 paper pad, giving her numerous pattern options without taking focus away from her holiday photos. The patterned squares, rotated on point, create a great foundation and the white matting gives the whole page flow and continuity. Read Summer's tips below and give this style of grid a try. You'll love the results!

the magic of christmas

angled page tips from summer

- ★ Consistency is key. No matter the angle you choose, make sure you apply that same tilt throughout your page design. A long ruler will be your friend!
- ☀ To help you determine what part of the 6x6 paper you want to cut out, create a template from a scrap of vellum or transparency. You can slide the template around the paper until you identify the section you want to use.
- ☀ For geometric shapes, use a punch or die for perfectly straight edges every





snowy play

create (2" strips

One of the challenges when using a 6x6 paper pad is covering an area of space that is longer than 6". Marla has two ways to solve this dilemma

For the multi-striped piece, she simply cut two pieces and butted them together across her page. With a striped pattern, the seam barely shows.

For the vertical strip of brown patterned paper (far left), she trimmed two pieces to two equal lengths and glued them to her page with a gap in



between. Marla then covered the gap with one of her 12-point stars. Clever!



To download the 12-point star electronic die cut file created by Marla, visit scrapbookand cards.com/bonus-files.

give it a try!



Die cut two small 12-point stars—one from thin chipboard and one from white cardstock. Adhere the white star to the chipboard star. Punch a 1/8" hole into the tip of each point. (Note: Think of the 12 punched holes as the numbers on a clock)



Trim 36' of twine. Glue or tape one end of the twine to the back of the star. From the back at 12 o'clock, pull the twine through to the front. Thread down through the hole at 5. Repeat in this order: up at 11, down at 6; up at 10, down at 3; up at 9, down at 4; up at 8, down at 1; up at 7, down at 2.



Continue weaving by threading the twine up at 7 and down at 12. Repeat in the following order to complete the pattern: up at 6, down at 1; up at 5, down at 10; up at 4, down at 11; up at 3, down at 8; up at 2, down at 9. Glue or tape the remaining twine to the back and trim excess.



Attached a glazed brad to the center of the finished star. Die cut one large 12-point star from contrasting patterned paper. Adhere the twine star to the patterned star.



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
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easy, detailed, expert

BY STACY COHEN

Whatever level of difficulty appeals to you, our easy, detailed, expert column has fantastic ideas to try today

Ordinarily, I'm a very slow scrapbooker. I enjoy spending two or three evenings on a layout, fussing over all the details until everything looks just right. But, occasionally, I just want to make a simple page that can be completed in one sitting. Whether you like to take your time exploring your creative possibilities or want something that's simple and comes together quickly, you can create a layout that fits your style, mood, and time frame. All you need are a few basic design variations, like the ones I've put together here.

For my easy layout, I kept the design clean and simple, using coordinating products from a single paper collection to streamline my creative process. By opting for a fairly linear design, I didn't spend time trimming intricate shapes or sizes—just a few basic rectangles were needed. I made a quick title by pairing letter stickers with a rub-on word. And nothing says "time saver" like pre-made die cuts, stickers and enamel dots, which easily add a bit of punch to any page.



To give my detailed layout some pop, I matted the paper and photos with black cardstock. I kept with the same linear page design but softened the overall look a bit by rounding the corners in the center. And the combination of chipboard letters, a "love" sticker, and faux stitching creates an eye-catching title. For more dimension, I replaced the die cut flowers with a chipboard variety. Finally, a chipboard heart next to the journaling label balances out the pageby creating a design triangle. By strategically placing my three chipboard elements (the hearts and the flowers) by my three main areas of emphasis (the title, my photos and the journaling), I'm able to help direct the overall flow of my page.

For my expert layout, I hand-stitched the title—a technique that requires more time but is worth it for the fresh texture it adds. I carried that same texture through to the center border, which I outlined with additional hand-stitching. I made the pink roses using floral dies, and I fussy cut some daisies from patterned paper. To create the clock accents, I stamped on a transparency using solvent ink, which doesn't smear on smooth surfaces, making it easy to create your own custom transparency images. By adhering my banners using dimensional adhesive, I created extra depth, while the rhinestone-filled heart adds some pizzazz.

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

watercolouring 101 BY JILL FOSTER

From markers and watercolour pencils to reinkers and Gelatos, there are many approaches you can take when it comes to creating the trendy, hot look of watercolour. Read on to discover a few artistic approaches to watercolour using markers.





you are my happy

- 1 Trim and fold a 4.25"x5.5" card base from white cardstock, with the opening at the right.
- 2 To create the red foundation piece, trim a 4"x5.25" piece from watercolour paper. Colour the piece using a red water-based marker and blend using a paint brush and water (refer to tutorial on page 39).
- 3 Apply Gesso to the edges of the piece using your fingertip, and set the piece aside to dry. Once dry, adhere the piece to the card base using foam adhesive.
- 4 Trim three 1.5"x2" pieces from patterned paper, including a sentiment piece, as shown. Ink the edges of each piece using dye-based ink and an ink blending tool (or sponge).
- 5 Referring to the photo for placement, adhere the pieces to the card using foam adhesive.
- 6 Trim a 1.5"x2" piece from watercolour paper and stamp a hedgehog (or other image of your choice) using black dye ink. Colour the stamped image using water-based markers and blend using water and a small paintbrush (refer to tutorial on page 39). Set it aside to dry. Adhere the piece to the card using foam adhesive.
- 7 Add a butterfly sticker and sentiment circle using foam adhesive to complete the design.

to my lovely valentine

- 1 Trim and fold a 4.25"x5.5" card base from white cardstock, with the opening at the right.
- 2 Trim a 4"x5.25" piece from white cardstock. Ink and stamp the piece following the steps on page 39.
- 3 Ink the back side of the upper left corner of the background piece using blue ink. Fold the corner down, as shown, and secure using foam adhesive.
- 4 Trim a small square of cardstock to fit upper left corner of card (where the piece is folded over). Colour the square using a marker, and stamp with a text image. Adhere the piece to the top, left corner of the card base.
- 5 Adhere the completed background piece to the card using foam adhesive.
- 6 Die cut two notebook pages, one from watercolour paper and one from white cardstock. Adhere the white cardstock piece to the card, as shown.
- 7 Stamp a designer heart onto the watercolour die-cut piece using black dye ink. Colour the piece using water-based markers and blend using water and a paint brush. Add splatters to the background area using your paint brush and watered down ink. Adhere the piece to the card using foam adhesive.
- 8 Trim a 2.5"x1.25" piece from white cardstock, and stamp a sentiment using black dye ink. Trim a 2.75"x1.5" piece from pink patterned paper. Mat the sentiment piece to the pink piece and cut a v-notch into the right end. Adere the assembled piece to the bottom, left side of the card at a slight angle using foam adhesive. Trim excess paper.
- 9 Die cut a 1/2"x3" scalloped piece from pink patterned paper and adhere it to the right edge of the stamped notebook piece. Add pearl enamel dots to complete the design.

you have my heart

- 1 Trim and fold a 5.5"x4.25" card base from white cardstock, with the opening at the bottom.
- 2 Trim a 5.5"x4.25" piece from notebook patterned paper and adhere it to the card base.
- 3 Trim a 5.5"x4" piece from watercolour paper. Stamp a floral background around the four sides using black dye ink. Note: Allow the stamped design to go off the edges, as shown.
- 4 Colour the stamped image following the instructions on page 39.
- 5 Add black splatter using a paintbrush and marker ink mixed with water.
- 6 Wrap twine around the stamped piece three times and secure the ends to the back of the piece. Center and adhere the piece to the card front using foam adhesive.
- 7 Attach white pearl dots to several of the flowers, as shown.
- 8 Stamp a sentiment onto a chalkboard sticker using embossing ink. Sprinkle with white embossing powder and heat set.
- 9 Hand-draw a frame around the inside edge of the sticker using a white pastel pencil. Lightly ink a few areas of the chalkboard sticker using white ink and your fingertip to create faux chalkboard "dust."
- 10 Adhere the sticker to the card using foam adhesive. Tie a length of twine into a bow and adhere to the left side of the chalkboard sticker.
- 11 Add a pearl dot to the center of the bow to complete the design.

Stamp an image onto watercolour paper using bleed-proof, dye-based ink such as Ranger Archival ink. Die cut into a shape as desired.



Using Tim Holtz distress markers*, apply colour to the areas where the shadow would be the



Working in one small section at a time, apply water to the area that would be the lightest using a paint brush.



Usiing a paint brush, gently move the water into the coloured area, allowing the marker ink to blend and bleed on its own.



Allow each section to dry completely, especially areas that are side-by-side. You can speed up the drying process using a heat tool.



To add depth and strengthen your colours, repeat steps 2-4 directly over the same areas.

watercolour background



Trim a piece of smooth, white cardstock to fit the front of your card.



Using a foam blending tool, apply orange ink** in a circular motion across the bottom of the cardstock, working towards the top.



Using green ink, apply it above the orange ink in the same circular motion, allowing it to slightly blend into the orange ink.



Using blue ink, apply it above the green in the same manner, allowing it to slightly blend into the aqua green.



Stamp a random pattern over the inked background using light brown ink.



Strengthen the colours around the edges by applying more ink with a foam blending tool.




Work with the memories you have—that lovely combination of facts and feelings by ALIEDWARDS

Last year, I spent time with my Mom at my childhood home, where we went through school papers and such that she had collected for my two siblings and me over the years. She's one of those wonderful people who keeps just about everything (challenging to store, but a total treasure trove). As a memory keeper, getting to flip through that collection and pick out what was meaningful to me was so cool.

One of the things I came across was a list of my favorite things, which I had written at age nine (in 1984). So awesome. I immediately took a photo of the list, both because it's a great representation of the kind of thing I want to document about my own children and their childhood experiences, and because I found it to be the perfect jumping off point for a series of three layouts about me—Who I Was. Who I Am and Who I Want To Be.

It's the process of putting this series of pages together that I want to share with you. I think you'll find it to be an informative approach to documenting your story, as there is often much self discovery that takes place when the creation of pages includes both reflection (looking back) and intention (assessing today and looking ahead).

How do you even attempt to encapsulate all that you were, are and want to be on just three layouts? The truth is, you don't. Instead, you work with the memories you have—that lovely combination of facts and feelings.



who i was

layout 1: who i was

In my case, having that list of Things I Like from 1984 definitely provided some concrete facts about what I was into at that point in time. Without it, my story would have been different—broader and less specific. Not better,

layout 1 ideas

- 1 Do you have any memoriabilia from your childhood or early years that tell a piece of your story? How can you incorporate it onto a layout? I didn't use my actual list but instead used Photoshop to create a new one. I also could have added the photo I took of the original list to my layout.
- 2 Are your memories a bit . . . rusty? Try an online search. Sites like Pinterest can offer amazing trips down Memory Lane. Simply type in a year or decade and any supporting search terms that could help jog your memory (ex. 80s cartoons, 70s fashion, 60s music). Odds are, the results will have your list of likes coming back to you in a very fun way.

not worse, and still just as real. No matter the approach you take, facts, feelings or a combination of the two, it remains about working with what you have.

Without my list, I simply would have asked myself the question, "What things were important to me in my childhood?" I likely would have remembered some of the things on the list (soccer, swimming, movies), but I seriously doubt "\$1 Billion dollars" would have maintained. That type of thinking comes directly from the mind of a child, and I love that my mother's willingness to keep my belongings allowed me to tap into that youthful mentality.



layout 2 ideas

- Create a list of 10 things you like right now (or 10 things that are important to you) as a way of communicating who you are at this point in time. I went with pretty general things, but you could easily get more specific (gummy bears, for instance).
- 2 Play with your approach of adding your list to your page. On this layout, I printed out my 10 things and cut them up before adding them to my layout, rather than just adhering the list directly to my page.



Naturally, this exercise was easier than the Who I Was, because I'm in it right now. On the other hand, it also proved more challenging, because life is more complicated than Cabbage Patch Dolls and posters on my bedroom wall.

With life's many adult complications, you may find it challenging to focus your list. To help target my approach, I started with a broad brush-home, family, kids, and music-areas of high importance to me. By ensuring those topics were covered, the smaller details were also able to come into view—hello, Gummy Bears and Staying Sanel

As you create your list, don't worry or overthink it. The reality is, most of the things on your Who I Am list could result in their own layouts. Create those pages as you're inspired to do so, but don't feel obligated to do so now. This is simply meant to be a snapshot of your life. Again, no right or wrong, just choices we each make as we figure out the paths we want to walk with our stories.

layout 3: who i want to be

really think about how I wanted to address the topic of Who I Want to Be. After all, that's a pretty darn big life topic. My answer ten years ago would probably have included different things than my list today. And my answer a few years from now will likely differ from right now.

Sure, I could have simply listed things I want to have in the future—an approach that would naturally align itself with the other two pages I've created for this series. Instead, I decided to go more with feelings and write about the person I hope to be. I addressed some of the things I struggle with right now that I

hope to either accept as they are or let go of so I can move on. This approach allowed me to keep the story authentically me, because, truth be told, most of the time I have no idea who I want to be "when I grow up." But I do know what's real, and that's what I can offer my story.

I hope you enjoy taking this complete look at your amazing life and the self-discovery it offers. In the spirit of that self exploration and with the New Year around the corner, I'd like to invite you to join me for my 12-month One Little Word workshop. Approach your holiday memory keeping with simplicity and zero scrapbooking stress

Im no papercrafting Scrooge, but I'm going to level with you: I used to loathe scrapbooking the holidays. Every December, I'd put my memory keeping on hold for the month. Why? A number of reasons, but mostly I felt there was too much pressure to nail the perfect holiday pages. I mean, let's face it: the winter holidays are pretty picturesque, right? But I just couldn't handle the pressure I put on myself to capture those memories perfectly.

Then I got over it and realized that I didn't need to change my approach to scrapbooking just because of big, intimidating holidays. The point is, when you let go of grand expectations for the perfect family photo, you might find your cell phone is the key to creating a truly memorable holiday portrait.


pg 2: ho ho ...





A simple way to create a shaker pocket (like the one I created for my layout on page 59) is to slip a bunch of sequins into a pocket and seal it with washi tape.

Whip up a quick journaling card by combining a piece of patterned paper with an office supply tag.

Memorabilia, like receipts, tickets and used gift cards, are excellent snapshots of your life that fit nicely in pockets.



If you can't resist the bulk of a really cute wood veneer or cork embellie (like me!), just glue it outside the sleeve so that the accent doesn't buckle the pocket.

Many of your photos will have open space. Fill that space with stamped images, rub-ons or small stickers to dress up your shots.

Don't be afraid to mix several styles of pocket page protectors in your albums. Not only will it add variety but your choices of pocket sizes will be that much greater.

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
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
